George D. Richards Dies Suddenly From Internal Hemorrhage

Funeral rites are pending for George D. Richards, aged 61, who died in a Eugene hospital early yesterday morning after a short illness. Mr. Richards was taken suddenly ill Monday evening. About 2:00 o'clock Tuesday morning he called for a physician and was rushed to the hospital, where he died twenty-four hours later from an internal hemorrhage.

Mr. Richards came here two and a half years ago from Gledale, this state, and during his residence here has made his home at the Cottage Grove hotel. He was employed by the Durable Fir Lumber Co. as foreman.

A daughter, Miss Marion Richards, a graduate of the local high school this year, left for Grand Rapids, Michigan, two weeks ago and another daughter, Rosemary, arrived here from Fort Klamath yesterday morning.

Interment will be made in the Resthaven cemetery in Eugene, it was said by Mr. and Mrs. Nels Nielson, old-time friends of the Richards, who are making funeral arrangements.

There are five daughters and three sons. Marion of this city, and Rosemary of Fort Klamath are the only children living in Oregon, the others living in the eastern states.
