Appeal to Help
Locate Huge Meteor

Scientists appealed to citizens in and about Portland Tuesday to keep up a search for some part of the giant meteor which rumbled through the heavens Sunday morning with a terrifying noise.

Prof. W. F. Meyer of the University of California was of the opinion that the meteor probably had disintegrated into dust motes or iron oxide.

His theory was supported by observers who reported sighting the blazing meteor before it disappeared in a cloud, followed by a series of detonations that shook buildings.

One fused mass brought forward by a woman who reported it had rattled off her roof after the explosion proved to be nothing more than a "clinker."

Ray Trask was the only local resident to report seeing the meteor, sighted while fishing at Waldo lake.
