Pheasants Closed to Hunters Except in Three Counties

The proud cock pheasant of the Willamette valley, and the little quail for that matter, will be perfectly safe during the 1939 hunting season—except in Josephine, Jackson and Douglas counties, where a daily limit of four cock birds has been ordered with a weekly limit of eight.

The reason is that the game commission in session Friday at Portland closed the Willamette valley to upland game bird hunting.

The surprise move came when the commission studied the history of China pheasants in Oregon. The first birds—10 cocks and 18 hens—were planted near Albany by Judge O. N. Denny in 1882. In 1891 the first open season was declared and Linn county alone saw an opening day kill of 30,000 birds.

During that interval the original planting has spread from the coast to the Cascades and for a distance of 200 miles along the Columbia river.

Bag limit of 1939 east of the Cascade range was established at four birds a day, including one hen, or eight in possession for the week. Season was set from October 1 to 15, except in Malheur county, where the season will extend to October 31.

So rapidly are Oregon's elk herds increasing that the commission voted to declare a limited open season on females of the species.

Special permits will be issued at \$5 apiece to 500 hunters during the open season on the giant deer from October 29 to November 12—the regular open season on bull elk.

The open season on antelope was moved ahead this year to allow hunters to take better trophy heads. The season will extend from October 6 to 8 inclusive. Special \$5 permits will be issued

to a limited number of hunters. Lake county will receive 300 permits and Malheur and Harney counties will be issued 150 permits apiece.

Open season on deer was established from September 20 to October 25, both dates inclusive. The bag limit remains the same—one buck mule deer or two Columbian blacktailed bucks per hunter.

CORRECTION ON BERRY PRICES

In an article of the berry market in the last issue of the Sentinel, the impression left was that the prevailing price was 25 cents per gallon on all berries where the purchaser picks and furnishes his own container. The prevailing price of the loganberry as we understand the market is twenty-five cents per gallon, and thirty-five cents per gallon or three for \$1.00 for the boysenberries.

OUR SHARE OF BEAR CREEKS

PORTLAND—Lane county has three of Oregon's 42 Bear creeks, according to the findings of the Oregon Federal writers' project of the WPA, which is conducting research on the origins of the state's geographic names. The other 39 Bear creeks are distributed through 20 different counties. In addition there are also Bear Trap, Bear Wallow, Bear Canyon, Bear Camp, Bear Lake, Beartree, East Bear, West Bear, Big Bear, Grizzly and several Little Bear creeks.

Two of Oregon's 29 Elk creeks are in Lane county, and two of the 21 Deer creeks, two of the 20 Cougar creeks, two of the nine Wildcat creeks, one of the 10 Panther creeks, one of the 13 Wolf creeks and one of the nine Coon creeks. Lane county has the only Groundhog creek in the state. Some of the other animal names which have been used for Oregon streams are Baboon, Badger, Bobcat, Cow, Cat, Dog, Fox, Gopher, Hog, Mule, Horse, Porcupine, Rabbit, and Sheep creeks.

WPA DEMONSTRATION

Less than 400 of Oregon's 14,700 WPA workers walked off the job at 11:00 Wednesday morning as a demonstration against the recent ruling boosting WPA hours from 100 to 130. It is reported, however, that all those taking part in the walkout reported for work Thursday morning. Approximately 160 of Lane county WPA workers left their jobs. Sixty-five were reported to have walked off the works at Corvallis, 42 at Marshfield and 95 in Multnomah county.

Twenty percent of traffic accidents reported in the state of Oregon during the month of May occurred between the hours of 7 p. m. to 5 a. m., Earl Snell, secretary of state, announced today. For April, accidents during this time of day amounted to 26 percent of the total reported to the secretary of state. The most dangerous time of day, so far as traffic accidents are concerned, is from 4 to 6 p. m. the figures showed.

Oregon farmers decreased their traffic accidents by nine percent during May, 1939, compared to May, 1938, figures released by Earl Snell, secretary of state, showed today. Farmers were involved in 224 traffic accidents this May, compared to 247 for the same month a year ago!

LUMBER BUSINESS MAKES GAIN

SEATTLE, Washington.—New business taken by 143 down and operating Washington and Oregon lumber mills during the week ending July 1 exceeded the production of those mills by more than 10 per cent, the West Coast Lumbermen's association reported today.

Orders reported taken by the mills were 110,356,900 board feet. Production totaled 100,198,904. Shipments during the week were

103,330,199 board feet. The increasing unfilled order file at the mills stood at 366,684,084.
