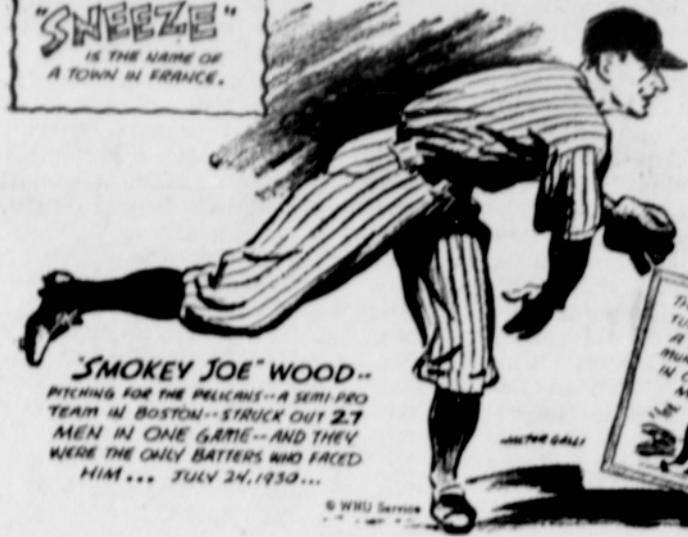

**News Briefs**

Lane county's only cannery at Eugene is employing 700 men as the cherry season nears an end. There will be about 1,800 on the job in August in the midst of the vegetable canning season.

Paul V. McNutt, Friday tossed his hat in the ring as a compromise candidate for president on the democratic ticket, with the string attached that he would not be a candidate if President Roosevelt seeks a third term.

Bob Pastor, New York heavyweight, Friday signed to fight Joe Louis for the heavyweight championship at a place and date to be selected later. The fight will likely occur September 20 at Detroit, it was said.

President Roosevelt Friday approved plans for an antarctic expedition headed by Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, for the purpose of claiming land already explored there by Byrd. The expedition for which \$340,000 has been appropriated, is scheduled to start in October.

Dr. Francis E. Townsend will lecture on his old-age pension movement before the second annual institute of foreign affairs in Portland, July 17th, it was learned here Saturday.

A bill requiring filing with the general land offices notices of existing placer claims on public domains passed the house last week and was sent to the senate. It would also require claimants to a yearly statement showing that they have performed \$100 assessment work on each claim.

The first hop sales contract of the season was filed last week in the office of the county clerk at Eugene, which calls for delivery of 80,000 pounds of hops on the Seavey farm on the McKenzie to Williams and Hart of Portland, at a contract price of 25 cents per pound.
