

Summary of Oregon's 1939 Hunting Season

The following is the summary and hunting seasons for 1939 as set forth by the Oregon state game commission:

Game Animals.

DEER—Open season, September 20 to October 25. Bag limit: Two Columbia blacktail or 1 mule deer having not less than forked horns. Special regulations — 500 antlerless deer tags will be issued for area adjacent to Mule deer reserve in Lake and Klamath counties, during regular open season. Fee: Resident \$5, non-resident \$25, in addition to regular hunting license fee. Specified area in Grant county will be open to antlerless deer hunting during regular season. Doe deer tags will cost \$1.00 in addition to hunting license. No limit on total number to be issued.

ANTELOPE—Open season October 6, 7 and 8. Bag limit, one of either sex. Number of permits to be issued: Harney county, 150; Malheur county, 150; Lake county, 300. Fee: Resident \$5, non-resident \$25, in addition to regular hunting license fee.

ELK—Open season: September 3 to 9, inclusive, in Clatsop county. October 29 to November 12, inclusive, in Morrow, Grant, Baker, Union, Umatilla and Wallawa counties. Big limit: One bull elk having horns. Fee: Resident \$5; non-resident \$25; in addition to regular hunting license fee. Special Regulations — 500 tags for adult cow elk will be issued for northeastern Oregon elk territory. Fee: Resident \$5, non-resident \$25; in addition to regular hunting license fee.

GAME RESERVES — Ochoco and Myrtle Park reserves will be open during regular deer season. Canyon Creek game reserve will be open to bow and arrow hunting from September 20 to October 3, and thereafter to rifle hunting also until close of deer season.

BEAR — Open season: Entire year except in Klamath, Jackson and Josephine counties, where open season is from November 1 to 30, inclusive.

SILVER GRAY SQUIRRELS — Open season: September 1 to October 31, both dates inclusive in Clackamas, Marion, Yamhill, Washington, Benton, Polk, Linn, Lane, Jackson, Douglas and Josephine counties. Bag limit: 5 such squirrels in any 7 days.

Upland Game Birds

CHINESE PHEASANTS — Open seasons: October 1 to 15, in Klamath, Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Wheeler, Morrow, Umatilla, Wallawa, Union, Baker, Grant, Crook and Deschutes counties. October 15 to 31, in Douglas, Jackson and Josephine counties. October 1 to 31, in Malheur county. October 15, 18, 22, and 25, in Harney county. Bag limits: 3 male birds in any one day in Harney county. 4 male birds in any one day and not more than eight male birds in any seven days or in possession at any one time in Douglas, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Wheeler, Morrow, Baker, Grant, Crook and Deschutes counties. 4 birds in any one day and not more than 8 in any seven days or in possession at any one time, with one female pheasant allowed in a bag of 8 birds, in Malheur, Umatilla, Union, Hood River and Wallawa counties.

QUAIL (California or Valley and Bobwhite)—Open season: October 1 to 15, in Klamath, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Grant, Wheeler, Morrow, Umatilla, Union and Lake counties. October 15 to 31, in Douglas, Jackson and Josephine counties. November 1 to 30, in Deschutes, Crook and Jefferson counties. Bag limits: 10 in any one day, and 20 in any seven days or in possession at any one time.

GROUSE—Open season: August 20 to September 5, inclusive, in Baker, Union, and Wallawa counties. Bag limit: 4 in any one day, and 8 in any 7 days or in possession at any one time.

HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGE — Open season: October 1 to 15, in Wasco, Sherman, Wheeler, Morrow, Union, Umatilla, Wallawa and Baker counties. October 1 to 31, in Malheur county. Bag limit: 6 birds in any one day, 12 in 7 days or in possession.

Fur Bearing Animals. Open season: November 15, 1939, to February 15, 1940, for mink, muskrat, otter and raccoon. Closed season: Beaver, fisher marten, ringtail rat and civet cat.

JUNIOR LEAGUE BASEBALL TOURNAMENT

HILLSBORO—Preparing for a mass visitation of baseball fans from all parts of the state, improvements on the Hillsboro baseball diamond were under way this week as initial plans were laid for the Junior Legion state tournament to be held here on August 5 and 6.

Chief among the changes being made on the diamond is moving of the backfield fence to enlarge the field. With NYA supplying the labor, the "home run barrier" is being moved 40 feet beyond its original location and a system of stringers is being installed for a circle of canvas around the athletic field.

Tentative plans call for the setting up of bleacher seats to accommodate attendances of 1000 or more persons and arrangements are being made by the American Legion committee in charge for all the fanfare usually attendant upon a state tournament.

Four teams, winners in sectional playoffs, will compete in the double header finals. Visiting players will be housed in the Shute park auditorium, which is located just across the highway from the baseball diamond. Ample parking space for thousands of cars will await visiting fans.

Meets with Hillsboro sports enthusiasts and Junior Legion ball officials last week, F. W. Robison, chairman of the Legion's state baseball committee, pledged the state organization's wholehearted support of the tournament. Also lending his efforts to make the two-day sports event a success is Biddy Bishop, president of the Old-Timers' Baseball association and well known Washington county resident.

Non-Resident Motor Vehicle Permits

The city of Portland reported 646 non-resident motor vehicle registrations during the month of June to lead stations in the Willamette valley area in this respect, it was announced today by Earl Snell, secretary of state.

In the entire state registrations for the month totaled 21,918, bringing the year's total to date to 53,014, compared to 53,122 for 1938. For June last year the registration totaled 21,325, 693 under this June's registration.

Ashland held first place in number of registrations this June with 3,615. Others in the first ten were Cave City, 3,096; Brookings, 2,081; Grants Pass, 1,323; Medford, 1,040; Umatilla, 1,021; Klamath Falls, 943; Bend, 877; Arlington, 756; Gold Beach, 673.

California was, as usual, the largest contributing state to non-resident registrations with 10,205 from that state. There were 4,257 from Washington, 755; from Idaho, 599 from Canada and 468 from Illinois. There were three cars from Mexico, three from England, three from the West Indies and one from the Dutch West Indies.

Eugene became the only city in Oregon to institute a "100 Deathless Days" contest in traffic safety this year, it was announced by Earl Snell, secretary of state, today. The contest there is being sponsored by a morning newspaper.

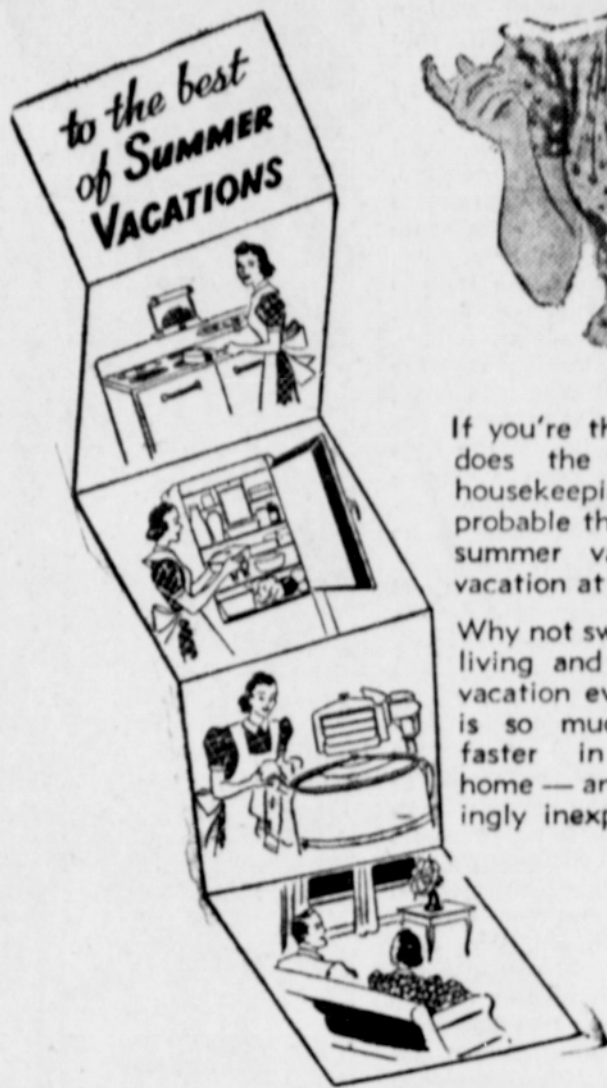
