The flash also melted part of an iron fence near the tree, but no one was injured.

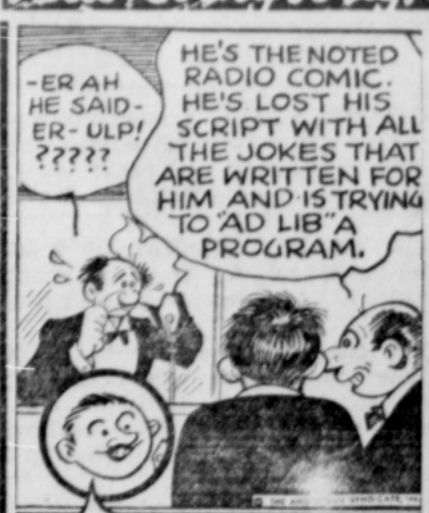
