County Officials Seek to Stop the Illegal Use of Gas

County officials are seeking to stop the illegal use of county gasoline for private purposes. Resolutions condemning the use of county gasoline for private purposes were drawn up and signed by Clinton Hurd, county judge, and Cal Young, county commissioner, last week. Walter Holland, county commissioner, refused to sign the resolution saying at the time he did not feel it was sufficiently thought out to make it operative.

Some of the officials expressed opinion that the only way to stop the gasoline leak was to store county cars at the court house and the building of such storage might entail considerable expense, which might not offset the leak in the gasoline. The resolution demanded a strict accounting of every gallon of gasoline used for county purposes.

Judd Stauffer, court house custodian, is alleged to have admitted that he used county purchase gasoline for private purposes, but said that he had done enough extra work around the court house outside of his regular duties to more than make up for gasoline used privately. He charged that it was a political move on the part of a republican judge to throw him (a democrat) out of a job.

The county gasoline bill is said to run around \$33,000 per year.
