Congress to Adjourn By Middle of Week

Adjournment of congress the "middle of next week" was agreed upon Monday at a conference between senate and house democratic leaders in Washington.

This plan was announced on the senate floor by Majority Leader Barkley, who indicated he hoped congress would complete action either August 2 or 3.

"I have conferred with the house leaders and we believe that congress can adjourn by the middle of next week," Barkley announced. He said senate committees had about completed consideration of all pressing legislation and that only action by both branches is necessary.

House democratic chieftains, while agreeing to the plan, were hopeful and the widespread rebellion in their branch against New Deal legislation brought from Majority Leader Rayburn a statement that "We must get out of here soon."

Barkley, obviously irked at the slow progress both branches have been making, served notice on the senate that it would work longer.

This development came after the powerful house rules committee pigeonholed, at least temporarily, a vital part of President Roosevelt's multi-million dollar lending program. It agreed to postpone consideration of a request by democratic leaders for legislative right-of-way for the \$800,000,000 U. S. housing authority bill.
