

Blanket Lumber Rate To Eastern Seaboard

SEATTLE, Washington — The mixing of certain forest products with lumber subject to blanket 82-cent rate in carload shipments, from the West Coast to territory east of Chicago, at a charge based on the carload rate for each of the products so mixed was announced Monday by George T. Gerlinger, Chairman of the traffic committee of the West Coast Lumbermen's association. This territory includes such important west coast lumber market centers as the Atlantic seaboard and the New England states.

"Application for the privilege of mixing carload shipments of millwork and other items with shipments of lumber to eastern territory was made by the association in August, 1936," Mr. Gerlinger said. "The traffic committee has been advised by the executive traffic officers of eastern and transcontinental railroads that the application has been approved in part. The mixture rule approved for publication by carriers will permit shipment of plywood, pickets, glued stock, and frames, KD."

Removal of the rate handicap that prevented the mixture of such items is an important step forward in the distribution of west coast forest products, Mr. Gerlinger said.

Union High Board Lets Five Bus Bids

Bids were let Friday evening by the Union high school board for five school buses, to be used in the transportation of high school pupils from the various districts.

The new buses will have a carrying capacity of 304 pupils. Two federal buses purchased through the Golden Rule will have a carrying capacity of seventy-one pupils each. Two Diamond busses purchased through the Cottage Grove Motor Co., will have a carrying capacity of sixty-one pupils each and a G.M.C. purchased through McCoy's Garage with a carrying capacity of 42.

On the previous evening the board adopted the Union high school budget as published in the Sentinel two weeks ago.

BOUNTY RAISED; GARDNER REAPPOINTED.

The Lane county court voted to increase the amount of payment on bounties of certain animals at a meeting Monday. The price of \$2 for bobcat, lynx and wildcat skins was increased to \$2.50.

Acting in its ex officio capacity as county board of health, the court signed an order approving the appointment of Dr. E. L. Gardner as county health officer. Dr. Gardner was reelected to the post on January 7 of this year but no order of election was made at that time.

CHICAGO (Special) — A new King Lion was crowned Friday in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, when the international convention of Lions Clubs unanimously elected Alexander T. Wells of New York City president of Lions International. Wells, who is a lawyer, served the past year as first vice president and was United States representative upon the International Council of Lions clubs. He succeeds retiring president, Walter F. Dexter, state superintendent of public instruction in California.

The voting concluded a four-day convention climaxing the association's greatest year of growth. In the past twelve months charters were issued to 557 new Lions Clubs, an all time high, and more than 17,000 net gain in membership was reported to the convention by Secretary General Melvin Jones of Chicago. Lions Clubs are now the most numerous service club in the United States and Canada. There are 3,500 in the association, with a membership of 125,000.

The new president is a native of New York city, where he has always lived. He was educated in the public schools and at St. Lawrence Academy, New York; Dwight Preparatory School and the New York Law School. He has been a member of the Bar of the State of New York for the past thirty-three years.

Local Boy Carries Off Honors in the Salem State Shoot

Participating in the shoot were Marvin Harpole and son Howard and Eddy Heck. 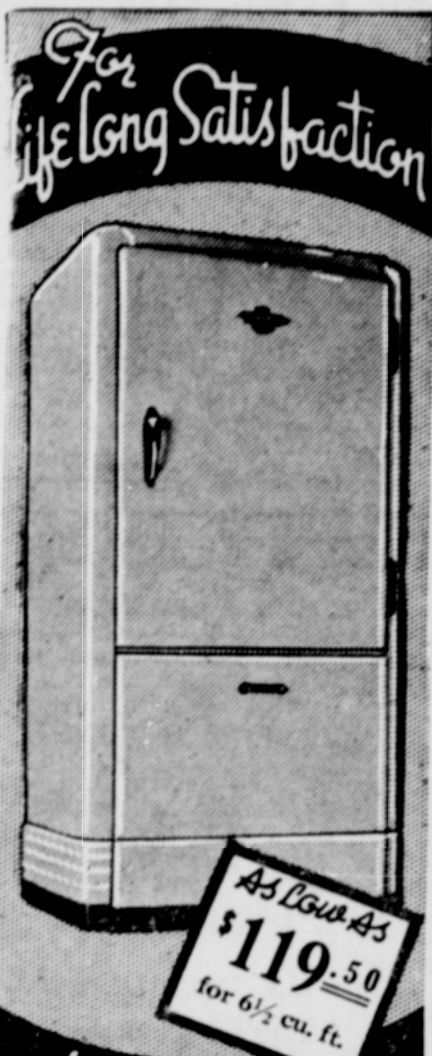

Fire Danger in Forests Mounts

Fire danger in the forest is increasing with each successive day of hot weather and logging operations may be further curtailed, if the heat wave continues, it was learned yesterday. The U. S. Forest service at Rujada yesterday reported an average humidity in that area of 25. Sunday the mercury ran to 98½ at the Rujada station, the highest of the season. No planes are being used for patrol service in this area yet, although if visibility becomes poor, the planes may be pressed into service. There are no fires in this area yet.

The county's first fire of any consequence was reported Tuesday to be burning over 11,000 acres of land, ten miles northeast of Sisters on Squaw creek canyon. Early reports said the blaze was being driven rapidly by a west wind toward a large pine forest. Tuesday the temperature at McKenzie Bridge ran to 100 degrees.
