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NOT SUCCESSFUL

The resettlement program of the government in settling midwestern residents in Oregon has not been successful, reports say and there are several reasons given for the failure of the resettlement project as it affects this state. Causes which have entered into the failure of the program have been the different conditions of the two sections, different type of farming, obligations imposed by the government the settler did not know existed, mismanagement by the project supervisors and the fact that human nature is what it is; i.e., the more effort to help some people, the more they expect.

BETTER OUTLOOK

Up to now it has been a pretty hard task to engender optimism about anything in this section of the country and yet those inclined to be pessimistic will agree that we have a good chance to see better conditions here in the near future. People generally are in better spirits over the immediate outlook for the reason that at the present time employment is more general than it has been for nine or ten years. There is no local skilled labor available now and so far as we know practically every able-bodied man has employment and no more WPA or PWA projects can be undertaken until more laborers can be had.

There is a prospect that development will be made along more than one line, but in one occupation, old timers will have to see some results before they can believe that it will amount to much, but strange things do happen and in this case, the ultraconservatives are due for a pleasant surprise.

If and when expansion comes, as it now appears, we hope that it will be done along substantial lines and not too much with the idea in mind of relieving a temporary situation.

GET READY NOW

It isn't pleasant to think of winter while enjoying the warm days of summer. But summer is the time when your home should be prepared against the cold and rainy period ahead, in the interest of comfort and fire prevention.

Check up on your heating plant first of all. Furnaces and chimneys should be thoroughly cleaned, and necessary repairs made by a qualified expert. Likewise, clean out the fuel bin and when you stock it arrange your fuel in an orderly manner. Papers or rags mixed in with wood or coal may result in spontaneous heating.

It is very possible that certain minor changes in construction in your home are advisable as an aid to fire prevention. Wood beams extending into chimney walls, for instance, have started many fires. And adequate fire stops are all-important.

Check over any exposed electric wiring—dark days bring maximum demand for light, and heavy use of electric heating appliances. Don't make amateur repairs yourself—bad wiring has caused many a serious fire. Your electrician will do it properly, and what little he charges is insignificant in the light of the fact it may save your home from destruction.

Finally, go through the house thoroughly, and clean out accumulations of papers, magazines discarded clothes, broken furniture and other inflammable junk.

Get ready for winter now. It's a little job that pays big dividends.

Convenient parking is a problem at times here and it occurred to us that more space might be provided by cleaning off some of the vacant lots on and near Main street and converting these lots into parking places for the shoppers. Once these lots were cleaned off and made accessible, maintenance would not be a problem. Traffic over the lots would keep the weeds and vegetation down.

It would be a help to the merchants and would be a fine gesture by the city if such a project could be worked out. If impractical for the city to get the necessary cleaning up done, then perhaps some organization might be interested in doing the good work. Maybe the Chamber of Commerce would like to promote the idea.

Chas. P. Pray was reappointed superintendent of the state police Friday by Gov. Chas. Sprague. The reappointment was accompanied by a two-page statement lauding the record of Pray. Senator Rufus Holman will press for approval of his resolution for an investigation of the immigration service before the adjournment of congress, it was announced at Washington Friday.
