Oregon Air Tours Eugene August 9

Frank Seal, general chairman of the Associated Flying Clubs of Eugene, announced Tuesday that the 1939 Oregon Air Tour will come to the Eugene airport next Wednesday, August 9th, featuring Oregon's own Tex Rankin who holds the international aerobatic title, and five other famous stunt performers.

The tour will arrive in Eugene at 10:00 Wednesday morning, led by the flag ship, a United Air Lines Boeing-247 luxury airliner. Another unusual ship to be displayed is the \$100,000 Lockheed-Electra flying laboratory entered by the Shell Oil company. There will also be a flitter fleet of light planes, a group of three to five place cabin planes, and a group of the modern, sleek high speed sport planes.

Both adults and children are urged by Chairman Seal to come to the airport early to see the exhibit of from 75 to 100 modern aircraft. This will be the most complete educational aviation feature which has ever been shown in the Pacific northwest. Forty different types of modern aircraft will be on exhibition, available for close inspection.

At 5:00 Wednesday afternoon, all of the hundred ships in the tour will take the air for the parade which will start the afternoon circus performance. Immediately following the parade, the breath-taking stunt and thrill acts will take place at the airport, displaying brilliant and spectacular flying. The air circus performance starting at 5:00 will be completed by 7:00.
