Northwest Suffers Million Dollar Fire

PORTLAND — The Pacific northwest is clearing away the debris of more than a million dollars worth of fires of "undetermined origin" which struck industry in two states during the past week.

The latest blaze occurred at Burns, Monday when the Ranch Supply company suffered a loss estimated at more than \$20,000.

A 24-hour period in which more than \$600,000 damage was caused, was climaxed Saturday night when a railway bridge spanning the Willamette river at Wilsonville, unaccountably burned. Estimates on the trestle fire have been calculated at \$75,000.

Included in the same 24-hour period were the fires at Vancouver, Washington, Friday night and one early Saturday morning at Hood River, Oregon. These two blazes caused an aggregate damage of \$600,000.

Previously in the week, a \$225,000 fire had leveled a wide area of industrial property in Chehalis, Washington.

Other smaller fires scattered throughout Oregon and Washington during the week accounted for another \$250,000 damages.

State police in Oregon, led by Capt. S. A. Malehorn of the arson detail, are investigating all fire outbreaks, but as yet have made no arrests.
