

Business to Get Breathing Spell

WASHINGTON — Proclaiming a five-months "breathing spell" for business, congressional administration leaders Monday called on private capital to "come out of hiding" and put the jobless back to work.

Tax laws have been modified, relief rolls are being scaled down and "it is now up to business" to carry the ball or face a new heavy spending program when congress convenes January 3 if conditions fail to improve by that time, New Dealers said as they headed for home after a seven-month session.

Prominent lieutenants of the president who have conferred with him in the last few days expressed belief he would "talk economies" on his swing across the country, tentatively set to begin October 1.

Senator Sherman Minton, of Indiana, Democratic senate whip, while explaining he was not speaking for the president, told International News Service:

"It is up to private business now, Congress, at the session just closed, did a lot of things business wanted done. Business clamored for a halt on spending-lending bills. Congress complied."

"Now it is up to business to take the bill. They will have five months with no congress in session, unless an emergency calls for a special term. But I have no doubt that if business doesn't pick up and the unemployed rolls are reduced, the government will have to step in at the session of congress beginning in January."

The 76th congress adjourned at Washington Saturday night after a final, furious clash between a new dealer and administration critics within the democratic party.

All work completed and the house in recess, the senate heard an exchange between Senator Pepper (D, Florida), enthusiastic Roosevelt supporter, and a group of other democrats which for plain forensic bitterness eclipsed any of the quarrels of the preceding seven months.

What Congress Did

Convened January 3, 1939.
Major measures passed — Defense program of nearly \$2,000,000,000; relief bill appropriating \$1,775,000,000 and curtailing WPA activities; government reorganization; social security revision; extension of Roosevelt monetary powers; Hatch bill barring most federal officials from campaigns.

Major measures killed—Roosevelt lending bill; Townsend old-age pensions.

Major measures postponed until 1940—Neutrality law revision; amendments to Wagner act and wage-hour act; Wagner national health program; railroad aid bill.

Appropriations authorized — \$13,000,000,000.
Bills signed by president—425.
Bills vetoed by president—18.
Bills awaiting presidential action—350.

Nominations confirmed by senate—10,967.
Nominations rejected by senate—12.

Recreational Camp Ends at Lake Cleawox

CAMP CLEAWOX, August 6 (Special)—Today ended a six-day camp for 78 women from three counties of Oregon held at this forest reserve area camp near Glenada. Permanent lodge and shelters built over a year ago by CCC labor were utilized again, the women divided among four camp units. Meals were served at the central lodge.

Women both from farm and town, both housewives and professional women, comprised those who spread their blankets in crude bunks in the shake-covered camp shelters. Shelters are in crescent-shape with the wide side open to an outdoor fireplace.

Singing accompanied each meal, and mornings, after the 8 o'clock breakfast, offered classes in sketching and beadwork, classes in swimming; in the afternoon, rest period follows luncheon until 2:30, when some speaker led the discussion period. During afternoons of the past week, Mrs. Geo. Bryant of Coquille, who is state president of the Business and Professional Women's clubs, told of a trip to Europe; Mrs. Frances Holmstrom of Coquille, author of "Western Windows," read her poems; Miss Helen Whitaker of Myrtle Point, on leave from her missionary teaching in China, talked on customs of China and Chinese women, and Mrs. Zena Latta of Marshfield discussed amateur photography.

Each evening, around a campfire circle, a newspaper of the day was read, there was singing and a varied program. Each unit of campers took a turn at writing the paper, choosing songs and arranging a program.

Director of the camp was Miss Julia Bennett, home demonstration agent of O.S.C. extension service, from Coquille. Others on the staff were Mrs. Rex Ingram of Marshfield, assistant director; Mrs. Lela Elrod and Mrs. Ethel Litter, nurses; Mrs. Sally Ward, North Bend, swimming instructor; Mrs. Christy, Eugene, choral reading; Mrs. Mary Hudson, Eugene, art instructor.

The camp is ideally situated on a secluded peninsula, heaving wooded, which is practically surrounded by the lake. Nearby are sand-dunes, over which campers may hike to the seashore. Many trails traverse the forest area, for restful walks.

No work of cooking or dishwashing is done by the women who attend, the principle behind this annual camp being to afford busy women a week's complete rest and recreation at extremely moderate cost.
