Wheat Allotments To Be Set Soon

Within a short time 1940 wheat allotments will be set for Lane county and notifications will be mailed to all farmers signed up under the agricultural conservation program, according to Raymond A. Johnson, chairman of the Lane county agricultural conservation committee.

Any farm on which wheat was grown in one or more of the three years 1937, 1938, or 1939, will receive an allotment based on the average wheat acreage grown during the four-year period 1935 to 1938, inclusive.

Farmers may request adjustment of allotments if they are dissatisfied. Fifteen days from the date shown on the allotment notification will be allowed in which to appeal to the county committee for reconsideration giving reasons for any adjustment requested.

"Operators of farms on which no wheat was grown in 1937, 1938, or 1939 may, by filing a written request with the county committee, on or before August 26, receive their share of Lane county's 344-acre reserve set aside by law for such "new" wheat farms," Mr. Johnson stated.

Cooperation in the wheat control program is entirely voluntary and no one need cooperate unless he so desires.
