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THE "STOURBRIDGE LION"

August 8, 1939, marked a significant anniversary in the history of our American industrial civilization. For on that day, 110 years ago, a locomotive ran on a track for the first time in the Western Hemisphere.

The locomotive was imported from England and was known as the "Stourbridge Lion," thought, according to an account, it looked more like a gigantic grasshopper than the King of Beasts. Before an excited, cheering crowd, it made a daring run of a mile and a half without exploding, or destroying the hemlock rails, as skeptics had predicted. And history was made. Native inventors were stirred, and from then on we built our own locomotives.
