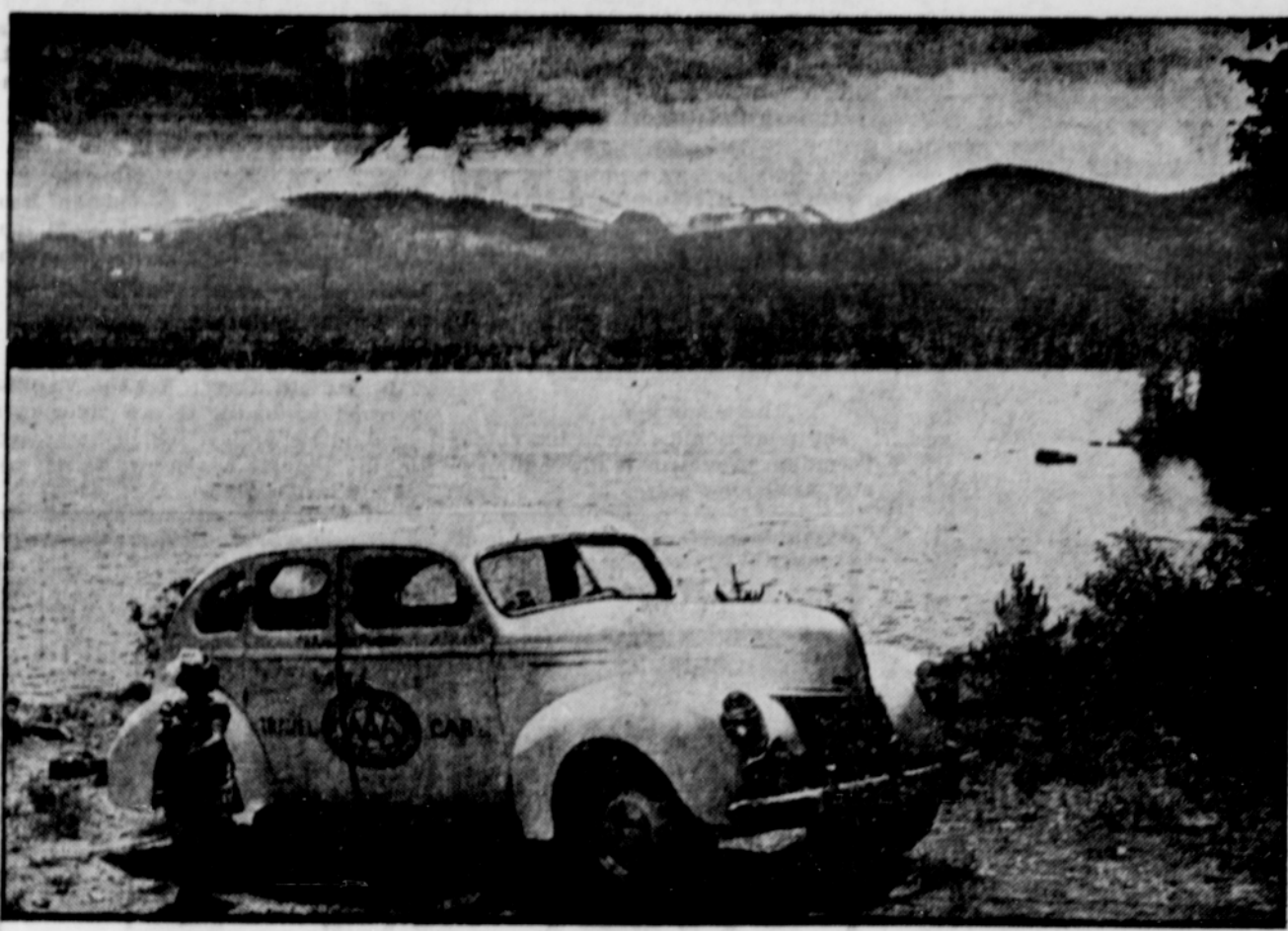


1939 Motor Cruise: Up the Clackamas

This newspaper is co-operating with the Oregon State Motor association and The Oregonian in presenting a series of motorlogs designed to stimulate travel in Oregon and the Pacific northwest. This article was condensed from a full-page article appearing in The Oregonian August 20.

Backyard playground is the descriptive term applied to the upper Clackamas river region and the summit of the Cascades where it is traversed by the Oregon Skyline road.

To log this scenic route in the interest of vacation travel the white motorlog automobile of The Oregonian-Oregon State Motor association made what is known as the Breitenbush loop trip, a distance of approximately 250 miles, Portland and return.

The motorlog car chose the road up the Clackamas river from Estacada to the Skyline road as the route providing the finest scenery and greatest vacation interest. Distance, Portland to Skyline road, 89 miles. Two alternate routes are available, one over the Abbot road, traversing the country east of Estacada; distance, Portland to Skyline road, 82 miles. Other alternate route is via the Mount Hood loop and Wapinitia highways. Distance to skyline road, 70 miles.

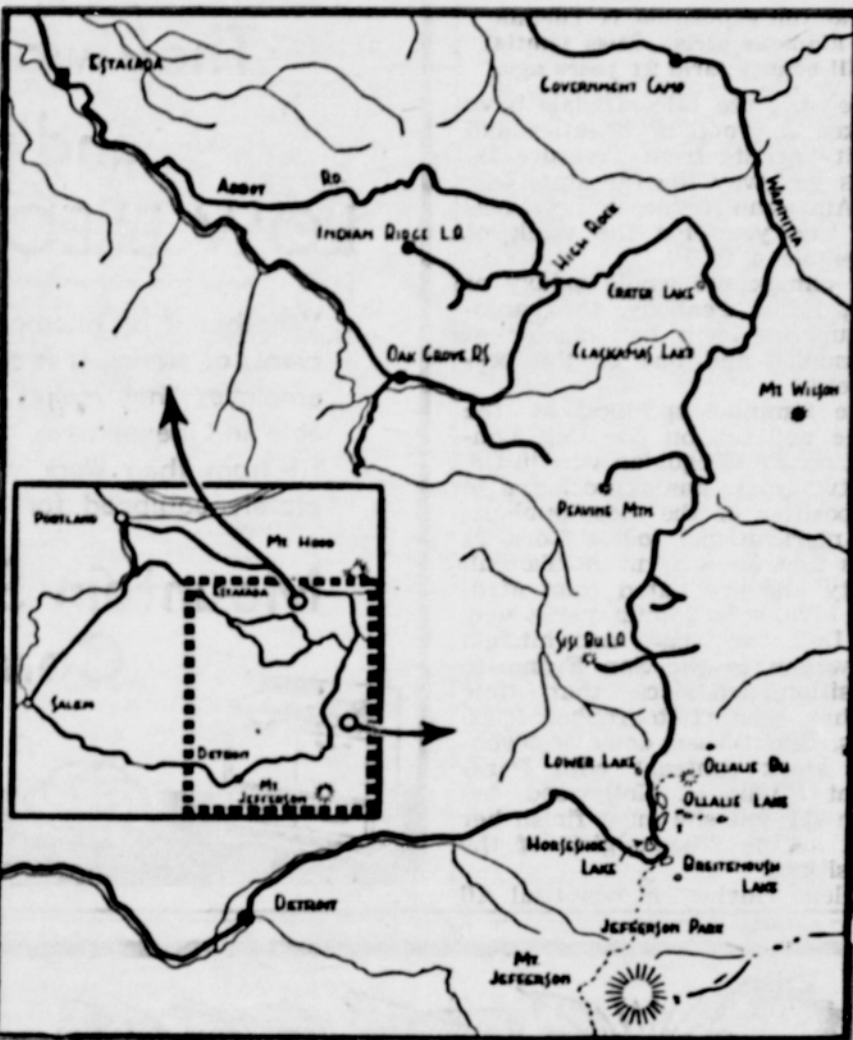
The point where these roads intersected the Skyline road is known as North Gate. Five miles south is Clackamas lake ranger station, where the motorloggers were overnight guests. A. O. Waha, supervisor of the Mount Hood forest, was guide for the expedition.

On the second day the party

made several interesting side trips by car and afoot, visited Olallie lake, 26 miles south of Clackamas lake ranger station, and, five miles farther south, Breitenbush lake, at altitude of more than a mile high.

From Breitenbush lake a fine trail leads south six miles to the primitive area of Mount

Jefferson park. Breitenbush lake also is the south end of the loop trip. From there the motorlog car turned westward, to follow the canyon of the Breitenbush river—famed fishing stream—then the valley of the Santiam river to make the return to Portland via Detroit and Silverton.

STATE FAIR NEWS WILL BE BROADCAST OVER KOAC

Arrangements for broadcasting state fair news direct from the grounds at Salem, and for inaugurating a new Oregon state department of forestry program over KOAC, have just been announced by Burton Hutton, director of agricultural programs on the state-owned station at Corvallis.

In addition to broadcasts each day of results of judging and other interesting events, the station has arranged to broadcast the opening ceremony of the fair on Labor day. Governor Sprague, fair officials, and several agricultural leaders of the state are expected to be heard over this initial program scheduled for 12:15 o'clock Monday, September 4. Daily programs from the grounds will be heard at 7 o'clock in the evening.

The new forestry department program will be heard on the third Friday of each month at 7:15 in the evening.

NEW TRAIN TO REPLACE WRECKED STREAMLINER

A modern 11-car streamlined train to replace the streamliner "City of San Francisco," wrecked by saboteurs in Nevada, was placed in operation on the Over-

land Route between San Francisco and Chicago, starting from Chicago August 23 and from San Francisco August 26, according to J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent, Southern Pacific company, Portland.

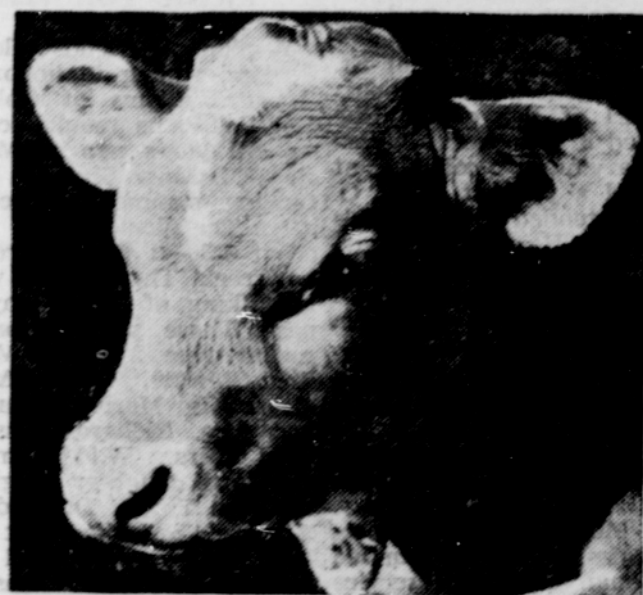
The train will carry the same name and operate on the same 39 3-4 hour schedule as the former train.
