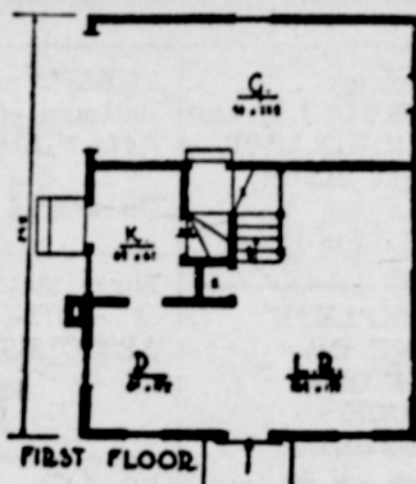
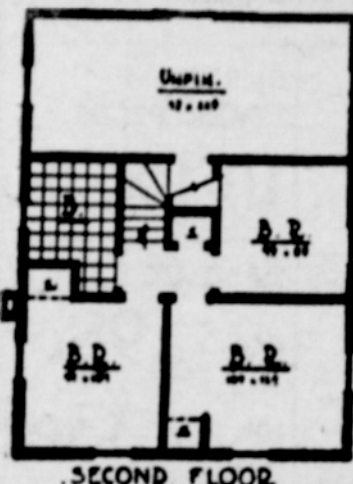

Low Cost Homes Demonstrated



Case-history studies of the original small houses built during 1938, in the national small homes demonstration's laboratory community at Fairway Hills, Maryland, have just been completed and their results made available to the public, according to W. C. Bell, Chairman of Western Homes Foundation.

These studies were confined to the homes in Fairway Hills which had experienced a complete cycle of seasons and afford striking proof that the modern low-cost home developed by the building industry is a means not only to lower living costs but to higher living standards for the average renting family. The home illustrated is NSHD House No. 7, one year after.

"Sixteen months ago the site of Fairway Hills was a jungle of berry bushes, scrub, pine, rocks and ravines, along a road near Washington, D. C.," states Mr. Bell. "Then the national small homes demonstration broke ground for its laboratory community of eight strictly modern low-cost homes. Today there are 29 additional occupied homes in the same cost class in this up-and-coming community. Eight more are being erected. And 150 more are projected for early construction."

"And what is even more interesting to the income groups that take in more than 80 percent of all American families — prospective home owners whose incomes are less than \$2500 a year — the values discovered by the original eight families of the building industry's Laboratory Community are the source of all the subsequent construction at Fairway Hills."

"The Fairway Hills figures are of unique value because they are the results of a laboratory experiment in low-cost housing by the building industry. They are a triumphant climax to an organized effort begun in 1933 by Western forest products manufacturers and building material dealers, to provide modern housing that the mass of American families could afford — the 80 percent with incomes of \$2500 or less."

"The results of the studies at Fairway Hills demonstrate: comfortable, convenient, and healthful housing at small first cost and at a monthly cost far less than rent; a release of part of the family income, formerly spent as rent, for other elements in better living; an increase in family savings despite the improved standard of living. The year-old laboratory community at Fairway Hills,

Maryland, is today not only an outstanding success as an experiment in low-cost housing; it is an equally outstanding demonstration of the vitality of the modern small home as a creator of business and pay rolls. Forty-five homes built and building! 150 more on the way!"

Lumber Industry Announces Trade Promotion Plan

Plowing the first furrow in a program to cultivate more trade for West Coast lumber in the farm-building field, the West Coast Lumbermen's association yesterday announced a trade promotion plan based on the cooperation of the industry's employees. The "first furrow" is a farm-building issue of "Big Trees," the association's picture - newspaper, which will be distributed to retail lumber dealers, contractors, and farmers throughout the farming belts of the country.

"Agricultural engineers agree on the estimate of \$550,000,000 as the annual expenditure for new farm buildings in the U. S.," the Association stated. "Many more millions are spent on farm-building repairs. The share of lumber in this business is larger than in any other construction field. Farm-building provides an outlet for West Coast lumber that is badly needed to balance its market, which has been mainly confined to home-building demand for the higher grades and finished items of lumber. Industry employees are invited to cooperate in the drive for more farm business, on the proposition of increasing employment through improvement of the industry's market situation."

"Many of the industry employees are themselves farmers. Many more have relatives and friends who are farmers, locally and in other sections. The Association believes that these groups and other employees will do their part in this effort by providing a large mailing list for the industry's farm-building literature and following up mailings with personal correspondence. It is only by such teamwork that West Coast lumber can overcome the market handicaps imposed on it by the far lower production and shipping costs of both foreign and domestic competitors."
