Albert McCall took Harry McCall, Bill Zimmerman and Theodore Bailey to the hop fields at Independence Monday.

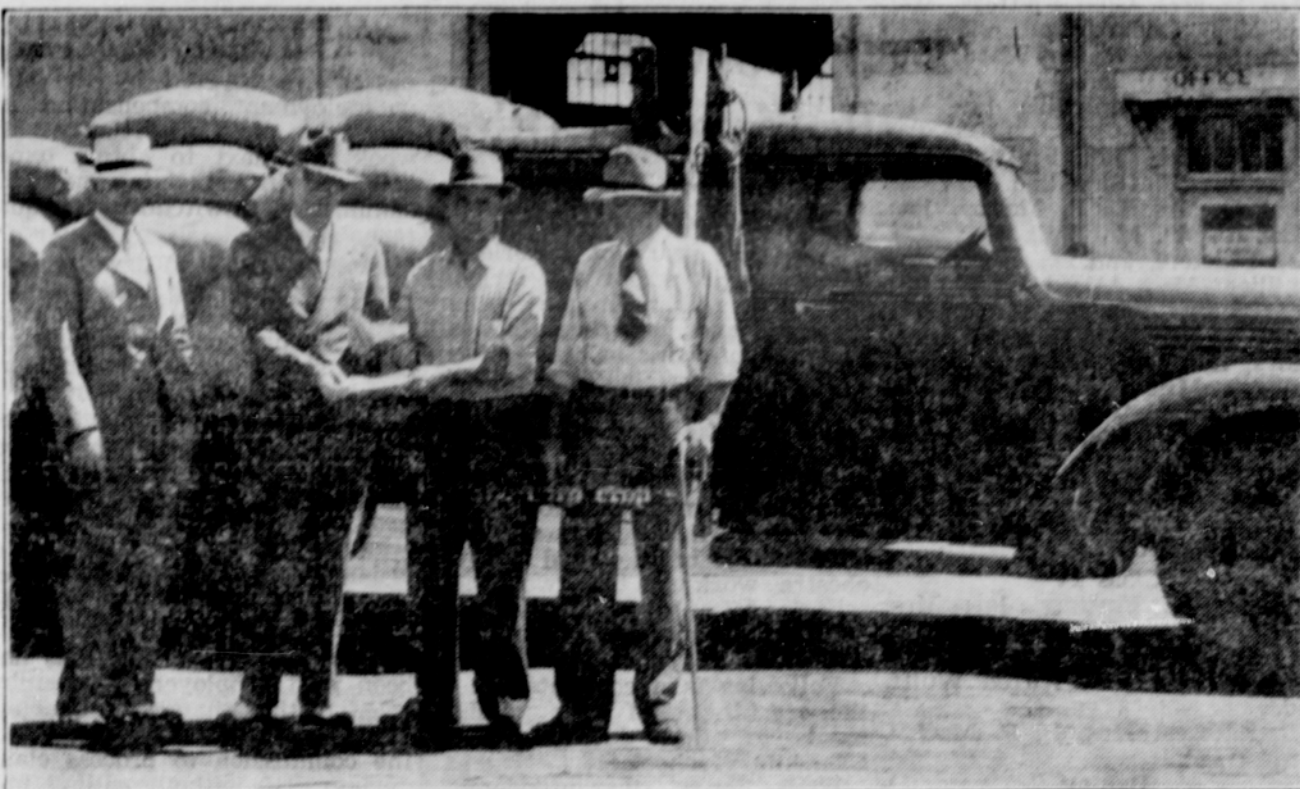
John Rente of Conway, Kansas, visited last week at the home of Mrs. Catherine Rente and Harry Rente.
