## A. Hitler Offers Peace On Own Terms At Danzig

Adolph Hitler in accepting Danzig into greater Germany Tuesday let it be known that he wanted peace—on his own terms. Representatives of Britain and France characterized his speech as full of misstatements. Hitler warned that Germany is prepared to wage a seven-year war if necessary, but would never again capitulate. He said that Germany and Russia, two of Europe's greatest nations, would reestablish law and order in Eastern Europe and that Germany has no war aims against England or France, but that Germany and Russia guarantee that Poland, as created by the treaty of Versailles, would never rise again and that Germany does not want Russia's Ukraine territory.

Early indications were that Germany and Russia had agreed on a division of Poland with about a third of the present nation of Poland serving as a buffer state between Russia and Germany and with Warsaw, the present capital, serving as capital of the new state.

Warsaw was still holding out yesterday against the German invaders, but the main Polish army had either capitulated or had fled into neutral territory. Most nations are still guessing as to the intentions of Russia, who has declared her neutrality. Some observers believe that Russia not only stepped in to get her share of the spoils, but to protect her border against a possible German invasion and that there yet be some difficulty between Russia and Germany. Others feared that the entrance of Russia into Poland might be the start of general division of the smaller nations of Europe and that a wide-spread conflict would result. In this event, it might be more difficult for the United States to stay out of war.

Others professed to see a chance of a conflict with the United States against Japan, not that Russia has left China to her own resources in signing a non-aggression treaty with Japan. Already there are signs of a clash between the American and Japanese interests in Shanghai. Still another view is that if Russia joins the side of Germany in the present war, such a combination would create a hot-spot for England and France and that the United States might eventually intervene because of a fear of the spread of Hitlerism to the western world. Russia, it appears, has one prime objective, and that is to spread communism in central Europe.
