Cut-throat trout are reported numerous in many of the coastal lakes.

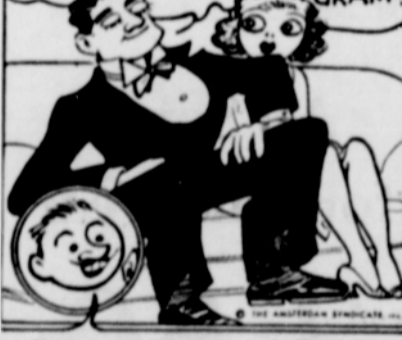

Good Business Is Predicted by Chief

WASHINGTON — Expressing the opinion that money was at least "coming out of the storm cellar," John W. Hanes, under-secretary of the treasury, said Sunday he was "extremely hopeful" that business recovery would absorb the majority of unemployment.

The youthful under-secretary, a former Wall street investment banker, said in an interview that he was "optimistic" on the business outlook because the "profit motive is returning," whereas in the last five years people were concerned chiefly with "safety."

With the recent improvement in business sentiment, "money—the most timid of all commodities—has been coming out of storm cellars," he said. "This, together with such treasury statistics as the upswing in miscellaneous revenues, indicates a healthy increase in the tone of business in my opinion."
