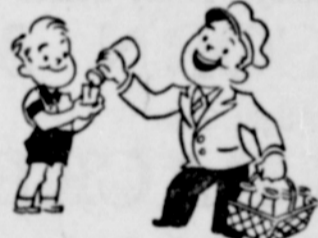
Johnny Gallo, Oscar Newton and Ivan Patten are among those hunting deer in eastern Oregon this week.

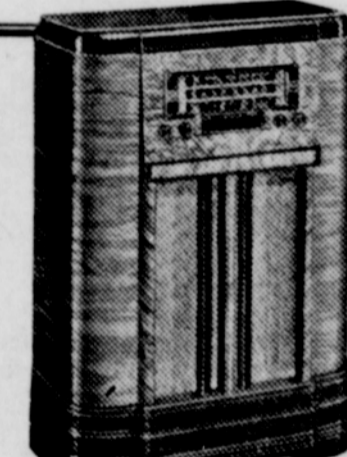

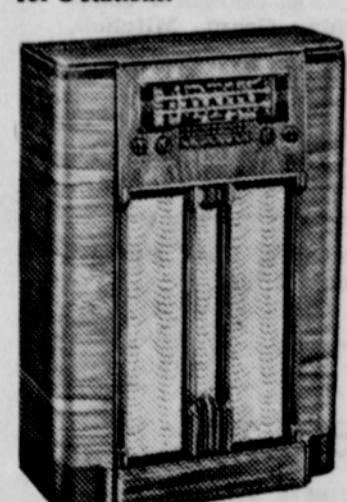
