C. G. Lion Trounce Sweet Home 20-0

In a rough and tough battle, the Cottage Grove Lions rolled over the Sweet Home Huskies 20-0 in what turned out to be a game marred with injuries and penalties Friday at Kelly Field.

The victory was a costly one for the Lions as their star ball carrier, Lusk, will be lost for the season with a broken collarbone. Baldwin and Jones may be lost for the Reedsport game.

The game opened with Sweet Home taking the offensive the first half but they were kept deep in their own territory by Spies' long, booming punts. Once Huffman, star Husky fullback, got away for a touchdown run but was caught from behind on a tackle by McKibben. The Groves' only offensive threat was a field goal try by Davenport which was wide. The half ended in a scoreless tie.

Opening the third quarter Dugan broke through the Husky line, blocked Huffman's punt, and Hendricks fell on the ball. The Lions' ground attack got underway with Davenport and Spies carrying the ball to the one-foot line. Spies smashed into the center of the line for a touchdown. Davenport's kick was good. Score 7-0.

Opening the fourth stanza, in which more yardage was gained and lost by each team by penalties than by runs, Huffman ran back the kickoff 40 yards, but Byers fumbled on the next play and McKibben recovered. Newton's beautiful catch of a long pass by Dugan, substitute halfback, carried the ball to the two-yard line. Dugan carried to the one and Krause plunged over center for the touchdown. Davenport's kick was good. Score 14-0.

Late in the fourth quarter Davenport intercepted a Husky pass and ran 47 yards through the entire Sweet Home team picking interference as he ran and crossed the goal line standing up. Davenport's kick was wide. Final score 20-0.

Star ground gainer and passer of the game was Huffman of Sweet Home. Davenport and Spies carried the burden for the Lions.

Dugan and McKibben were mainstays in the Groves' line. Walker and Tetsey played a bang-up game for the Huskies.
