Lions Win, Throw League Outcome In Three-way Tie

A smashing, driving Cottage Grove team threw the league championship into a three-way tie when they rolled over University high's Golden Tide 20-0, Saturday morning in an Armistice day feature at Kelly Field.

The first half was featured by good defensive playing by both teams and it was not until the second half that the Lions got rolling. They scored twice in quick succession, Bill Spies' pass was pulled out of the air by Hendricks who scored unmolested. Lusk went over for the extra point but fumbled and Earl recovered for the score. A few plays later on a short pass in the flat to Davenport, the Lions scored again. McKibben plunged over for the extra point. Score 14-0.

The Grovers' third touchdown came near the end of the fourth quarter after G. Dugan intercepted Gatlin's pass. Spies again tossed a pass to Davenport, who carried the ball to the Golden Tide's 8-yard line. McKibben cracked his own right guard to score. Spies' attempted conversion was wide. Score 20-0.

Only twice did the Golden Tide threaten to score, once as DeAutremont sneaked through the Grovers' line for 30 yards to the Lions' 27, but the play was called back because the Golden Tide had only six men on their line. Again the Golden Tide threatened to score as DeAutremont completed three straight passes to Plath who carried the ball to the Lions' 9-yard line, but they were stopped short of a touchdown as a fourth down pass fell incomplete in the end zone.

DeAutremont, highly-touted Golden Tide halfback, who was bottled up most of the game but got away for some long gains, led the Golden Tide offense. Davenport, galloping half, and Lusk, line-smashing fullback, carried the offense for the Grovers. Randall, gigantic tackle, and his team mate, George Dugan, stemmed Tides' offense while Hodges and Adkinson starred defensively for University High.

The game was attended by the largest crowd this season and ideal football weather prevailed throughout the game.

CHICAGO — D. U. Bathrick, general sales manager of Pontiac Motors Division, who attended the Chicago auto show last week, announced to a group of dealers at a luncheon in the Saddle and Sirolo Club that October deliveries of Pontiac cars throughout the nation have beaten all October records for the company. He said that he expects sales to continue at a record-breaking pace through the balance of the year.

"Deliveries of Pontiacs in October," said Bathrick, "showed an increase of 100.5 per cent over October, 1938, and 95 per cent over September, this year. Used car sales were also at high levels for this time of the year which is particularly favorable. Unfilled orders increased during the month and are at the highest point they have ever been at this time of year."

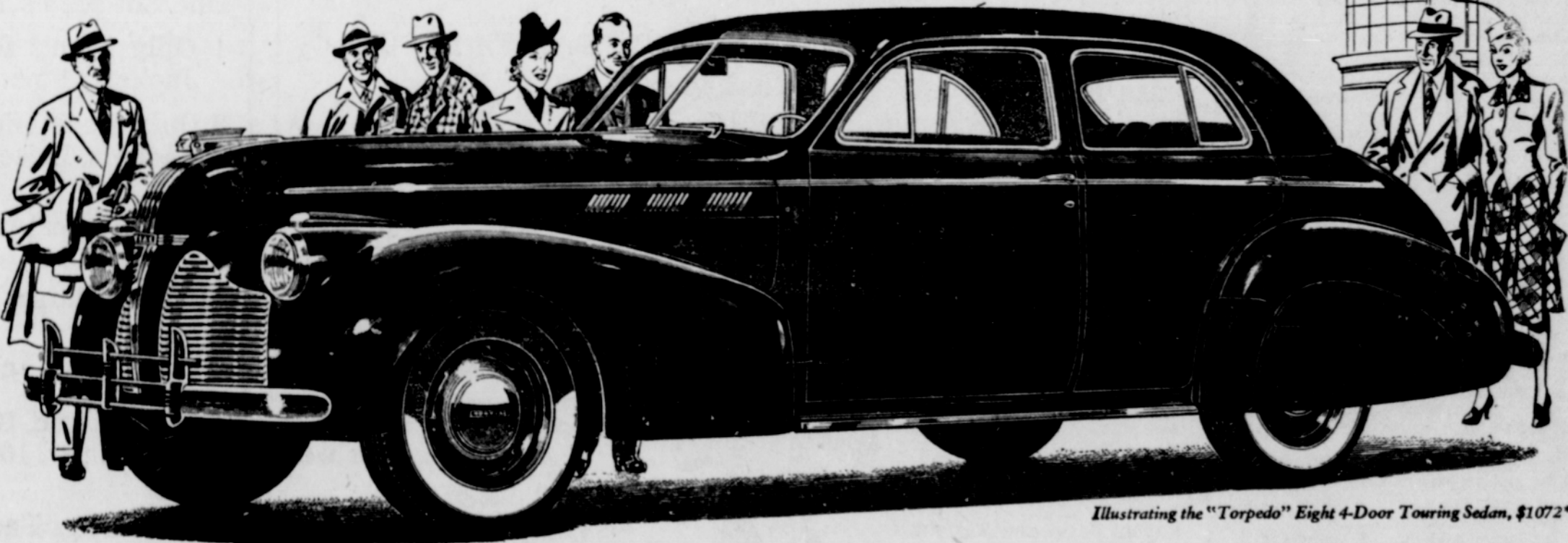
