Color Schemes of Licenses Brilliant

PORTLAND — Almost every shade of the rainbow will be employed in the various color combinations selected for 1940 automobile license plates by the 48 states, District of Columbia, Hawaii, Alaska and the Canal Zone, according to reports received by the Oregon State Motor association.

Oregon's color scheme of blue figures on a white background will be duplicated by Arizona. White on black, white on blue, yellow on black and black on yellow are the most popular combinations, having been selected by states. Color combinations include:

Alabama, yellow on black; Alaska, black on orange; Arkansas, vermilion on aluminum; California, black on orange; Colorado, black on yellow; Connecticut, black on aluminum; Delaware, unreported; Florida, white on black; Georgia, red on green; Idaho, green on gold; Illinois, cream on brown; Indiana, aluminum on black; Iowa, blue on orange; Kansas, white on black; Kentucky, red on white; Louisiana, blue on gold; Maine, green on aluminum; Maryland, white on dark blue.

Massachusetts, white on maroon; Michigan, unreported; Minnesota, white on black; Mississippi, yellow on black; Missouri, black on white; Montana, white on blue; Nebraska, orange on blue; Nevada, silver on ultramarine blue; New Hampshire, white on green; New Jersey, green on black; New Mexico, yellow on red; New York, orange on black; North Carolina, maroon and aluminum; North Dakota, yellow on black; Ohio, white on dark blue; Oklahoma, unreported; Pennsylvania, ultramarine blue on golden yellow; Rhode Island, white on black.

South Carolina, yellow on black; South Dakota, black on yellow; Tennessee, orange on black; Texas, purple on white; Utah, orange on medium blue; Vermont, blue on white; Virginia, black on white; Washington, green on white; West Virginia, yellow on black; Wisconsin, red on white; Wyoming, white on delphinium blue; Canal Zone, yellow on green; District of Columbia, black on chrome yellow; Hawaii, black on yellow.

Greater Farm Income Is Predicted By Officials for Year of 1940

WASHINGTON—Federal farm officials predicted Friday that farm income would reach \$10,000,000,000 next year, the highest since 1937, if industrial activity increases as is expected.

Included in the estimate are receipts from sale of agricultural products, the value of products consumed on the farm, and government benefit payments which this year may total \$750,000,000. This year's gross farm income is expected to be about \$9,500,000,000. The peak since the depression was \$10,424,000,000 in 1937.

The bureau of agricultural economics has forecast a "moderate" upturn in economic conditions in 1940 as a result of demands arising from the European war, "less cautious" buy policies on the part of business men generally, and prospects for a "considerable" increase in the output of automobiles and other durable consumers goods.

This general upturn, the bureau said, should result in enlarged consumer demand for farm products and consequently a larger agricultural income. The improved demand probably will be greatest, it said, for those products that enter rather directly into consumption, such as meat animals, dairy products, poultry, and fruits and vegetables. Some commodities, particularly pork, lard and dairy products, may benefit from increased foreign demand.

"Most farm families," the bureau said, "will be able to buy somewhat better living in 1940 than they bought in 1935 if national income from agriculture increases as anticipated."

While pointing out that farm production costs may rise and the cost of things farmers buy may increase, the bureau said the anticipated increase in farm income would more than offset these advances to give rural families an increased purchasing power.

The bureau also said that if costs of living rise, farm families as a group may feel the pinch less than city families.

"Costs of producing food for household use increase less than do retail food prices, hence most farm families can offset a rise in the general retail price level, in part, by planning to produce a larger-than-usual share of their

total food supplies," the bureau said.

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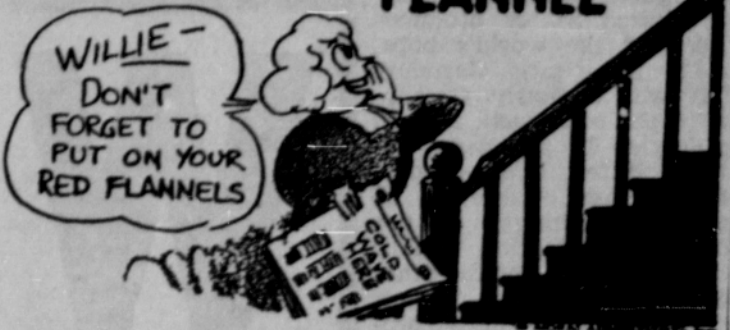
