Ten Accidents Occur During Hunting Season

Final tabulation of hunting accident reports by the state game department shows that during the various hunting seasons in 1939, there were ten accidents, eight of which proved fatal. Six deer hunters were killed and one wounded; one pheasant hunter was fatally injured; one duck hunter was killed and one duck hunter was wounded.

Eight hunters were killed or wounded as a result of shots fired by other hunters. The two duck hunters shot themselves accidentally.

The following counties had one accident each: Tillamook, Curry, Lake, Lane, Union, Baker, Grant, Douglas, Wasco and Linn. It is interesting to note that no accidents occurred in the area open to doe deer hunting in Grant county, where more than 15,000 hunters were checked in during the deer season. This is believed to be the result of hunters using

extreme care upon being warned of the concentration of hunters in the area.

A good record has likewise been achieved in the Clatsop county elk area where no accidents have occurred in spite of the large number of hunters invading the county each year since the opening of the elk season two years ago.
