Windows of glass were found in ruins of Pompeii, showing that they were in use before A. D. 79.

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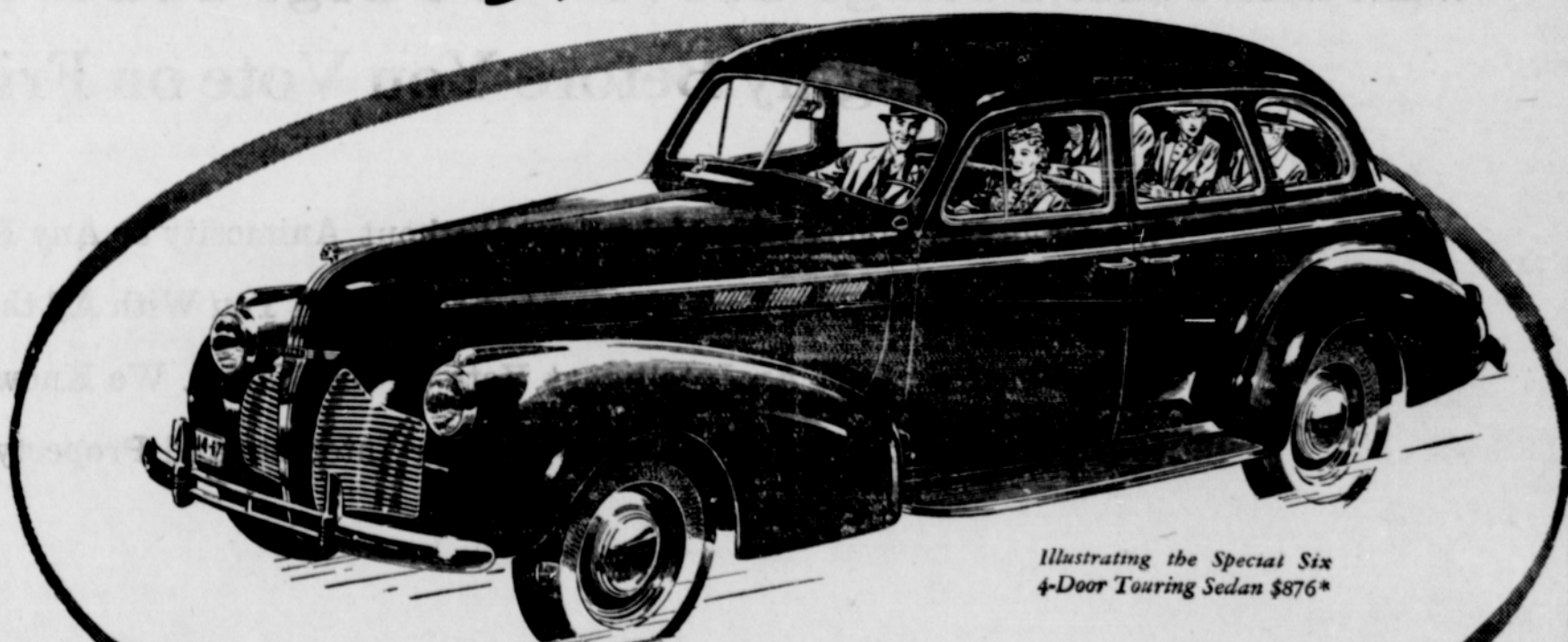
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
