

Bowling Tournament Enters Second Week

The bowling tournament at Bob's Bowling Alleys got off to a good start Monday of last week when Gustafson's finished with 2189 actual pins against 1813 for Texaco. Gustafson's team handicap was 492 against 771 pins for the Texaco. Gus took all honors for the evening with high single 197 and high single series, 525 averaging 175 pins per game.

Tuesday evening Standard Oil was defeated by the Postoffice, 2059 to 1807 actual pins. Standard's handicap is 780 against 591 for the Postoffice. High score for the evening was high single 172 by Davis and high series 449 by Wilson, both of Postoffice team.

Wednesday evening the Irish-Swartz and Safeway teams locked horns with the result that Irish-Swartz did well, considering their team is new, bowled a total of 1739 pins against a team of veterans who last year drew the prize for high series, but in the first game of the season only did average to 1938 pins. Morelock of Safeway had high single of 181 and high single series of 468.

Thursday evening, Quality Market set the pace with 2254 total actual pins, Gates' high single of 201, plus DeYoung's high single series put this team at the top of the list. Their opponents, the DeMolay's, new in the bowling field had 1906 actual pins, but a handicap of 708 against 447 for Quality left their scores, 2701 for Quality, 2614 for DeMolay.

Friday evening, the Men's Toggery, a new team, brought out a veteran bowler in George Marksbury. Their opponents, the Union Oil Co. team, won the battle by 2 pins after Lou Brissette's score of 193 single and high single series of 516 kept them from serious loss of all three games to The Men's Toggery.

Rites for Mrs. Sarah Ellen Tate Are Held Tuesday Afternoon

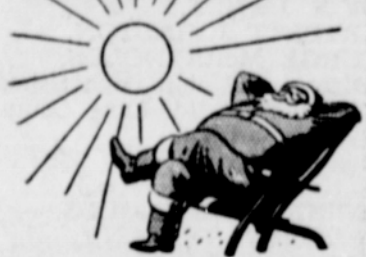

FIGURE REVISED ON DRIED PRUNE OUTPUT

Revised figures on the 1939 tonnage of prunes, as reported by drier inspectors for the state department of agriculture, show 22,407 tons handled in the 451 driers found to be operating. The revised figure is based on additional reports and a recheck of the original reports.

The 22,407 tons is based on figures given by drier operators and growers, department officials point out. Packers have estimated the 1939 Oregon dried prune crop as high as 4500 tons above the total the drier inspectors reported.
