

Pontiac Sales Break Record

Pontiac sales broke all seasonal records for the first twenty days of November, and showed a percentage increase over the corresponding period of October that is ten times greater than the four-year average for the whole industry, according to D. U. Bathrick, general sales manager.

"Figures compiled by Dow Jones for the industry during the last four years show that sales during the second month of a new model year average 3.2 per cent ahead of the first month," said Bathrick. "In comparison to this, Pontiac's increase during the first twenty days of November was 35.1 per cent ahead of the same period in October. First twenty days sales were the highest for any November in Pontiac history."

"Also, contrary to the usual fall trend of the industry, unfilled orders for new Pontiac cars increased during the last ten days, in spite of the fact that the factory is producing cars at the highest rate in history for this time of year. Last year, with production below this year, unfilled orders fell off the second ten days of November. Incidentally, we have 111 per cent more unfilled orders on our books than we had at this time last year, which is also a record."

"Used car sales continue to run well above both last month and last year, and although, as pointed out, new car sales are 43.5 per cent above last year, used car inventories are only 23.9 per cent above used car inventories of a year ago. New car inventories are still considerably below what is considered a normal stock."

"Every factor in our picture is so favorable that we can see nothing except a continuation of record-breaking sales for several months to come," concluded Bathrick.

FORESTER DISCUSSES DEER SEASON

"The recent Grant county antlerless deer hunting season supervised by the State Game commission marks a milestone in big game management," says L. H. Douglas, assistant regional forester in charge of wildlife management on the national forests of Washington and Oregon.

The Grant county deer herd has increased from an estimated 2,000 in 1922 to 48,000 in 1939, according to forest service studies, and the winter forage has been depleted to a point where heavy winter loss and possible extinction of this herd is imminent the first hard winter.

The sustained carrying capacity of this area originally was estimated by forest officers to be 25,000 to 30,000 deer but because the herd was allowed to increase to almost twice that number and destroy many of the principal winter forage plants, its future capacity has been greatly reduced. "It now is estimated that the carrying capacity of the winter range for years to come is not over 15,000 head," said Douglas. "To permit the winter forage to recover, probably not more than 10,000 should be carried for several years. According to authentic information the hunters took about 12,000 deer this season. Similar action should be taken again in 1940 because that number just about equals the 1939 fawn crop on the area. Further reductions will have to be made if the integrity of the herd is to be maintained. The only choice is to let sportsmen get the sport and the meat, or action less easily controlled will be taken by Old Man Winter, who is neither humane nor economical. To postpone reduction will tend only further to deplete the winter forage."

TIMELY RECIPES

Norwegian Tea Bread

- 2 cups milk
- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 cake compressed yeast
- 9 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 2 tsp ground cardamom
- 1/2 cup finely sliced citron, packed in cup
- 1/2 cup raisins

Scald milk; add butter, sugar and salt and cool. When lukewarm, crumble yeast into milk mixture in mixing bowl. Add 4 cups of the sifted flour and beat until smooth. Pour into large clean buttered bowl, cover closely, and set in a warm place out of draughts until doubled in bulk (about 2 1/2 hours). Then stir in rest of flour, turn out on floured board, and knead thoroughly until smooth and elastic. Knead in cardamom, citron and raisins a little at a time. Total time given to kneading should be at least 15 minutes. Replace in buttered bowl, cover, and again let rise to double in bulk. Turn out onto floured board and again knead down. Divide into 3 equal portions, shape in loaves and place in buttered loaf pans. Cover and set in warm place until slightly more than doubled in bulk; then slash each loaf 3 times across the top and brush with melted butter. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees) for 10 minutes; then reduce to 300 degrees and bake 40 to 50 minutes longer. Remove to cake racks and cool. Makes three loaves.

A cow belonging to A. C. Ball had twin calves last week.

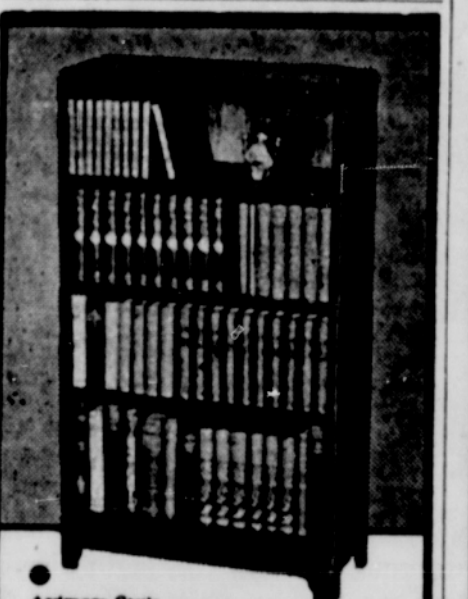

Mountain States Reorganization Gets Bean's OK

Salem, Ore.—Plans for reorganization of the Mountain States Power company were approved by Ormond R. Bean, public utilities commissioner, today.

The district court of the United States for the District of Delaware submitted the plan to the State of Oregon. The hearing was held in Delaware July 14.

There are at present 18,869 shares of preferred stock in the company held by 1,499 persons in Oregon.

The plan as presented by Delaware would entitle holders of 5 and 6 per cent first mortgage gold bonds to receive equal principal amount of new 5 per cent 15-year bonds, carrying interest at the rate of 5 per cent per year.

The earnings of the company would permit payment of dividends of approximately \$4.90 per share on the new holdings under the plan, were the company to be released from the jurisdiction of the federal court, Bean said.
