

Lowest Holiday Fares to Eastern Points on Now

Lowest holiday fares in recent years were announced by C. L. Townsend, general passenger agent, today, to go into effect on the Northern Pacific Railway, December 15. These low round trip fares will be good between all points in Washington, northern Idaho, some points in Oregon and to Vancouver, B. C.

In addition to being exceptionally low, tickets will be good for an unusually long period. Travelers may start as early as December 15, and not return until January 8, if they so desire. These tickets will be on sale daily from December 15 to January 1, inclusive, and will include reductions for all classes of travel—standard pullman, tourist and coach.

These reductions mean it will cost only one and one-third fare for the round trip and will be good on all trains including the North Coast Limited. Holiday menus will be featured in all Northern Pacific dining cars, as well as tray service in coaches and tourist sleepers.

WALNUT SURPLUS PROGRAM TO GET FEDERAL SUPPORT

Walnut growers in Oregon, as well as those in California and Washington, will receive government aid in the disposal of their surplus nuts above the established salable percentage for this year, the federal division of marketing and marketing agreements has announced. The surplus for the 1939-1940 crop has been established at 35 per cent, which will make available approximately 320,000 bags of surplus walnuts for export or diversion to the shelled walnut trade.

Payments not exceeding 4 cents per pound are provided under the program for all unshelled walnuts exported, or diverted to the domestic shelling trade, by the walnut control board. Sales of walnuts for export or diversion must be made before July 1, 1940, and the transactions must be completed before October 15.

CORN FEEDING VALUE DISCUSSED

ALBANY — While corn often gives very poor results if fed alone to growing and fattening pigs, when some protein supplement such as skim milk, butter-milk, fish meal or tankage is added, it takes top place among cereals grown on the farm, County Agent F. C. Mullen pointed out recently. Pigs weighing around 100 pounds will make better gains on ear corn than they will on shelled corn, but older pigs will

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
