

### Snell Addresses Lions Club 14th

The noon meeting of the Lions club was postponed until 6:30 Thursday evening so that club members might hear an address by Earl Snell, secretary of state, and honor a visit from Elton Schroeder of Myrtle Point, district governor of this district. Other visitors attending the meeting were: J. H. McClosky, state representative from Myrtle Point, Jess Clinton also of Myrtle Point and Angus Gibson, state representative from Junction City.

After a few words of greeting from District Governor Schroeder, the guest speaker of the evening, Earl Snell, and a member of the Salem Lions club, was introduced by Robert Fromm.

Mr. Snell spoke on the operation of the state government, calling attention to the many demands now facing state governments due to keeping pace with the changing conditions. A little over forty years ago he said the state legislature started the west by appropriating a million dollars and for many years after the legislature was known as the "Million Dollar Legislature." Last year the state legislature appropriated seventy-seven million dollars. But even so, with an approximate balance of five million dollars in the general fund, Oregon is in much better financial condition than either of her neighbors, Washington and California.

The speaker urged his hearers to take an active interest in the affairs of government and an active interest in politics and in this way keep post on governmental costs and a check on extravagance and corruption.

Previous to the address of Secretary of State, Ray Randall entertained the Lions with a tap dance. Earl Hill served as accompanist at the piano.

### Holiday Cookies

Every homemaker knows the joy of a well-filled cookie jar (or jars, shall we say) during the holiday season. What with the children home from school and the friendliness of relatives and neighbors "dropping in," there is nothing so completely satisfactory as knowing that you are prepared for these in-between appetites because you have plenty of cookies tucked away for just such occasions.

There just couldn't be enough cookies for they are a favorite with everyone—from the grown-ups to the grown-ups. And another thing about cookies—of all your Christmas confections none of them can be put to as many uses. Packed carefully and wrapped gaily cookies make acceptable gifts, especially for that business woman member of your family. Or if you are planning a Christmas basket, cookies are most appropriate. With ice cream or sherbet they will serve for the happy ending of the festive meal itself and with steaming hot chocolate, fruit juice or spiced milk, there is nothing better, as suggested above, for the drop-in guests.

Cookies, of course, are what you make them—meaning that the best cookies are made from the best ingredients. It is better to use a more economical recipe than to substitute for the butter, eggs and other ingredients that mean delicious flavor and high food value in the finished product. Nature has given butter a distinctly appetizing flavor as well as a high content of vitamins A and D, and for these reasons it is decidedly worthwhile to use butter in your cooking, wherever possible.

Here are two cookie recipes that suggest the holiday season:

#### Mince-meat Drop Cookies

1/2 cup butter  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
2 1/2 cups flour  
4 tsp. bak. pdr.  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 lb. mince-meat

Cream the butter; add the sugar gradually, creaming thoroughly. Add eggs one at a time, beating until fluffy after each. Add mince-meat. Fold in the dry ingredients. Drop by teaspoons on a buttered cookie sheet. Bake in hot oven 15 minutes.

#### Almond Crisps

1/2 cup butter  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 egg, beaten  
1 cup sifted cake or pastry flour  
1/8 tsp cream of tartar  
1/2 cup coarsely chopped blanched almonds

Cream the butter, add the sugar gradually and blend well. Add the egg, and beat well. Mix and sift the flour and cream of tartar, and add with the almonds. For each cookie, drop 1 1/2 level measuring teaspoons on a buttered baking pan. Bake in a slow oven of 300 for 14 minutes, or until brown. Makes 50 cookies.

### Paradoxical History Activity Continues In Bohemia Sector

Oregon Elephants

The usual reward for a man who heeds not his wife's wishes is that he must suffer her wrath. No exception was the case of the Benton county, Oregon, husband who repeatedly neglected his good wife's plea that their spring be cleaned. Many times she reminded him that a man should be sent to do the job, that the water had a foul taste and perhaps cleaning the spring would remedy this. One morning he left with her words ringing in his ears and as a result he was glad to send two men to do the work.

These two toiled away that day and their labors were rewarded by a momentous discovery for their tools brought to view not only sand and gravel but huge bones of a size they had never seen before. Later they were able to place beside these, teeth, each weighing several pounds. Of course all this pleased the good wife for she knew she was seldom wrong. That evening she firmly took her husband to the spring and with an "I told you so" look, pointed to a tusk weighing a hundred pounds. "How could anyone but a man expect a spring to be otherwise than bad with such a soup-bone as this?"

Incredible as this may sound it actually took place in the year 1919 within sixteen miles of the Oregon State college.

The discovery led to an elephant hunt engaged in by members of the Oregon State student body. Hands that ordinarily turned the pages of books were, with the aid of shovels, turning up mounds of soil and leaving trenches in their wake. The result was the uncovering of many elephant bones and an established fact that a number of these animals once roamed the fertile valleys of Oregon.

A fossil tusk believed to be one of the three largest known was found in the Myrtle Creek in the year 1926. A girl found it while fishing along the stream but did not report it for some time as she took it to be a snag. Being ten inches thick and a six-foot section it is rivaled in size only by a tusk found in India and another in Florida.

There is much evidence that these mighty mastadons once roamed the region west of the Cascades in great numbers. They together with other huge animals passed from this portion of the world with the exodus of the tropical climate.

#### AUTO LICENSE HITS HIGH SALE
