MANY SHEEP INSPECTED

Slightly more than 89,300 sheep were inspected for scabies during November and cattle inspections for scabies totaled 3,589, reports Director J. D. Mickle of the state department of agriculture. Three hundred and thirty-one swine were given immunizations. Other livestock work included 21,310 tests for Bang's disease with 242 cattle listed as reactors and 12,853 tests for tuberculosis with 50 reactors.

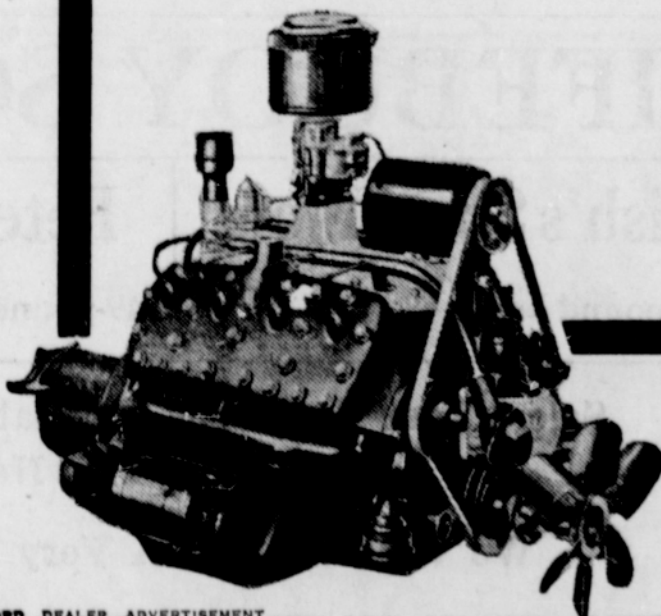
