Walnut, Filbert Growers to Meet

Walnut and filbert growers of Lane county will have special opportunities on Monday and Tuesday of next week to get assistance on their nut production problems and to obtain the latest information on control of filbert and walnut diseases and pests, soil management, irrigation, and related problems. An indoor meeting and two field meetings have been arranged by the Lane County Horticultural Society cooperating with the county agent.

The indoor meeting will be held the afternoon of January 15, starting at 1:30 p. m., in the Moose Hall at 77 West Broadway, Eugene. At this meeting C. E. Schuster, horticulturist of the U. S. Department of Agriculture stationed at the Oregon State college, will discuss nut soil management problems, including irrigation; and Dr. Paul W. Miller, plant disease specialist of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, will present latest information on control of diseases and insect pests of filberts and walnuts. It is hoped that Mr. Dohanian, federal entomologist, who is doing experimental work in the Willamette Valley on the control of filbert moth, will report on his findings to date.

Pruning of walnuts and filberts of practically all ages will be demonstrated at two field meetings on Tuesday, January 16. The first demonstration will be held in the orchard of Mrs. J. O. Holt, one mile north of the Ferry Street bridge in Eugene, starting at 9:30 a. m., by Mr. Schuster and O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist of O. S. C. The second demonstration will be held in the nut grove of F. E. Chambers, one mile west of Santa Clara, and in the adjoining grove of Lloyd Terry.

All interested people are invited to attend both the indoor meeting on January 15 and the pruning demonstrations on January 16, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agent.
