George H. Himes, noted pioneer and curator of the Oregon historical society, died Saturday at Portland.

The picturesque figure, born 95 years ago at Troy, Pennsylvania, served 54 years as secretary of the Oregon pioneer association and 40 years as the historical society's curator. He was known almost universally throughout the northwest.

Funds for Bonneville dam's activities during the coming fiscal year will be slashed if the recommendations of President Roosevelt, included in his budget message to congress Thursday, are approved.

Property Owners Get Right-of-way Checks Monday

H. G. Benson, right-of-way agent for the State Highway commission, spent Monday in Cottage Grove, distributing checks for right-of-way properties along the proposed highway route from Ninth and Main to the intersection of the present highway near the Chambers mill. All properties have been acquired for the necessary right-of-way except two and the six dwellings and church building offered for sale by the highway department have been sold, he said. Actual start of the highway construction will depend on final purchase of all properties involved.

H. H. Marr is reported tearing down a residence at 307 South Seventh street, preparatory to remodeling the building and the Elsie Lee residence on South Sixth street, purchased by Canfield and Savage, has been moved to the rear part of the lot.

Annual Hearing on Angling Regulations To Be Held Feb. 16

The annual hearing of the state game commission pertaining to angling regulations will be held in Portland on February 16, at which time sportsmen's organizations and others interested will be given an opportunity to submit their recommendations concerning seasons and bag limits for game fish.

Of particular interest is the proposed closure of coastal waters to fishing for trout over ten inches in length for a period of about three months for the purpose of protecting cutthroat trout coming in from the ocean to spawn in the streams.
