

Lumber Business Is 60 per Cent Peak

Seattle, Washington. — Weekly average of West Coast lumber production in December (4 weeks) was 118,168,000 board feet, or 60 per cent of the weekly average for 1926-1929, the industry's years of highest capacity realization. Orders averaged 115,644,000 b. f.; shipments, 113,489,000. Weekly averages for November were: production, 133,492,000 b. f. (67.8 per cent of the h. c. r. index); orders, 102,675,000; shipments, 119,785,000.

For 52 weeks of 1939, cumulative production, 6,426,951,000 b. f.; same period, 1938, 5,182,328,000; 1937, 6,322,654,000.

Orders for 52 weeks of 1939 breakdown as follows: rail, 2,787,019,000 b. f.; domestic cargo, 2,528,802,000; export, 421,671,000; local, 962,091,000.

The industry's unfilled order file stood at 452,187,000 b. f. at the end of December, gross stocks, at 930,000,000.

The most significant feature of the December market for West Coast lumber was a partial recovery from the curtailed buying which followed the buying hys-

Safety Driving School To Be Conducted Here On January 18th

A series of safety driving schools will be held in Lane county, beginning Monday, January 15, and continuing for seven weeks. It was announced yesterday. The schools are sponsored by Earl Snell, secretary of state, who conducts them in connection with his state-wide program in traffic safety.

Classes will be held at high schools in Junction City on Monday, Eugene on Tuesdays, Springfield and Oakridge on Wednesdays, Mohawk, Creswell and Cottage Grove on Thursdays.

Trained instructors furnished by Snell's office will be in charge of the work at all times. Students 15 years of age or older may register for the courses at their high schools. Each pupil furnishes his own car, but no driver's license is required. Cars must be driven to and from the schools by licensed operators, however.

Those who take the course will receive instruction in starting a motor, use of the clutch, shifting gears, turning and backing, parallel parking, stopping and starting on hills and other phases of driving under modern traffic conditions.

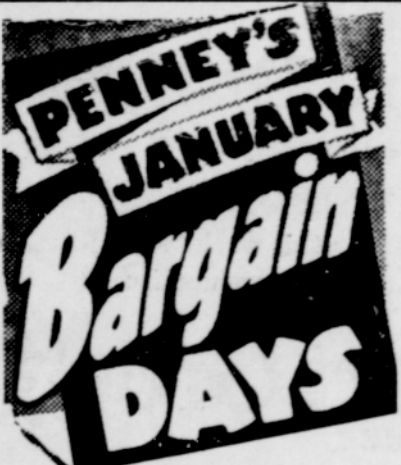
