

March of Dimes To Aid Paralysis Sufferers in U. S.

PORTLAND, Ore. — Birthday greeting cards to President Roosevelt will be a featured part of the "March of Dimes" in 1940 fight against infantile paralysis campaign, Keith Morgan, national campaign chairman, has notified Dr. E. T. Hedlund, Oregon state chairman.

The idea of contributing dimes as ammunition in America's war against the crippling invader—poliomyelitis—will be widely used in connection with the campaign which will reach its climax on President Roosevelt's 58th birthday on January 30.

In charge of this particular feature of the drive for funds is Commissioner George Allen of the District of Columbia, recently appointed by Morgan as chairman of the "March of Dimes" committee. Commissioner Allen will work in close cooperation with all state, county and city chairmen.

The President's birthday greeting card has been designed by the committee for the celebration of the President's birthday in order to enable hundreds of thousands of citizens to send their "March of Dimes" contributions direct to the chief executive at the White House and thus show they have individually joined with him in the fight. The card is so designed that it can be mailed to the person receiving it and filled with as many as 10 dimes, sealed, and then mailed direct to the White House in Washington.

It bears the likeness of a boy on crutches and a girl wearing braces, symbolic of the campaign last year and again this year. It can be so sealed that the contents are secured and safe.

During the past two years the "March of Dimes" idea as a means of raising funds for infantile paralysis sufferers has grown to tremendous proportions.

The first "March of Dimes" in 1938 resulted in a total of over \$81,000 in silver coins being sent personally by thousands of people to President Roosevelt at the White House for the fund. Other contributions through the sale of buttons and through contributions in coin containers swelled this sum.

Last year, the silver parade of dimes converged on the White House from every corner of the land reaching the stupendous proportions of over \$217,000. Other "March of Dimes" contributions in checks and bills added substantially to this figure.

The same plan of distributing the funds will be followed in this campaign as last year. One-half of all of the "March of Dimes" contributions will be returned to the counties where raised, the other half going to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Arrangements have been made so that every contribution, no matter how small, will be duly recorded and one-half will be returned to the county in which it originated. Furthermore, the portion of the card bearing the sender's name and address will be returned to the county from which it was sent.

How Oregon's victims of infantile paralysis are being restored to active, useful lives, was described by Morgan.

Stories of courage, hope and tragedy pour constantly into national headquarters of the committee from the chairmen of county chapters scattered throughout the United States, Morgan said.

Mrs. George Hutchinson, chapter chairman of Union county, told this story:

"We have a young woman, 21 years of age, who is an orphan. She has been afflicted by infantile paralysis since she was 11 years old. We are getting new braces for her so that she will be much more able to help herself. The vocational training organization has agreed to prepare her for some occupation and make her self-supporting. She graduated from high school with an exceptionally good record. All her studying was done at home.

"We feel that we are rehabilitating one person for as nearly a normal life as can be achieved under the circumstances."

Sam P. Miller, chairman of Klamath County chapter, writes: "... We have handled three cases. One patient is a girl fourteen years old, paralyzed from the waist down. At chapter expense she was sent to a hospital in Portland. After treatment she was sent home cured, fully able to live a normal life.

"For the past two years we have been helping a woman who receives treatment in a Portland hospital. We pay her fare and other necessary expenses."

The Oregon chapters of the National Foundation, like those throughout the country, are supported by funds raised by the committee through the "March of Dimes" and various celebrations.
