IRRIGATED PASTURES GIVE CHEAPEST, BEST COW FEED

A visitor to the experiment station at Corvallis 12 years ago would have found less than an acre of irrigated pasture on the station farms. Today there are approximately 75 acres of such pastures, used by three different departments of the experiment station both for experimental purposes and for low cost production of feed for station livestock.

This expansion in irrigated pasture acreage at the experiment station has been closely paralleled on farms throughout the state, as word of the success of this venture has been carried far and wide by the extension service and by the farmers themselves.

Financial gain through the development of irrigated pastures is emphasized in a recent experiment station bulletin called "The Value of Irrigated Pastures for Dairy Cattle," which gives the detailed results with the use of irrigated pastures on the station farm. The five-year average yield from fertilizer, irrigated pasture was equivalent to 6.4 tons of alfalfa hay, or 284 bushels of oats per acre.

Use of fertilizer on irrigated pasture has been found to be absolutely essential for most profitable returns. The yield on areas fertilized with 300 pounds of 16 per cent superphosphate per acre is 75 per cent greater than on areas not fertilized. The fertilizer experiments were carried out on a pasture of a little less than nine acres. Even with two acres left unfertilized, the area supplied 65 per cent of the nutrient requirements of more than 12 cows daily, which had an average production of 40 pounds of milk figured at 4 per cent butterfat.

AAA PAYMENTS AHEAD OF LAST YEAR'S SCHEDULE

Oregon farmers, who will receive about four million dollars for cooperating with the 1939 agricultural conservation program, have now received approximately half this amount, according to the state AAA office in Corvallis.

Payment of the remaining two million dollars is going forward rapidly, it was said. As soon as county offices have completed applications of farmers for payments, they are sent to the state office for approval and then forwarded to the U. S. disbursing office for payment.

Rate of payments for taking part in the 1939 farm program is considerably ahead of the schedule maintained a year ago, said N. C. Donaldson, state executive assistant.

ALL IMPORTED SEED MUST COMPLY NOW

The new federal seed law, effective February 5, will make it mandatory for all agricultural seeds shipped into Oregon to comply with requirements of the Oregon seed law on both labeling and noxious weed content regulations, states Frank McKennon, chief of the state department of agriculture division of plant industry.

Under the federal law, seed must meet the tolerance of noxious weed seeds of the state into which the seed is being shipped. The Oregon law, for instance, includes some noxious weeds that the federal law does not, so seed coming in will have to go a step beyond the federal law and comply with the Oregon noxious weed seed requirements.

Seed shipped out of Oregon, under the old law did not have to comply with the Oregon law, but under the new law it will have to be labeled completely to meet the federal law and seed laws and regulations of the state into which it is being shipped.

Labeling provisions of the federal law are similar to those of the Oregon seed law. Farmers over the county may expect marked improvement in the seeds they buy as the federal law becomes effective.

The new law becomes effective on vegetable seeds on August 9, 1940.

ARMY RECRUITS HAVE FAIR EDUCATION.

Eighty-three per cent of the 1712 men enlisted in the army during 1939 by the Portland recruiting district, which includes Oregon and parts of Washington and Idaho, had better than an eighth grade education, Lieutenant Colonel H. D. Bagnell, recruiting officer, announces. Of the other 17 per cent only half a dozen failed to complete their grammar school work, but were able to pass the required intelligence test.

Forty-two per cent were high school graduates and 35 per cent completed partly their secondary education.

The average age of the recruits was found to be 20 years. Twenty-three per cent listed themselves as laborers, 17 per cent as students, 12 per cent truck drivers, while 10 per cent said they came from farms. Nine per cent were enlisted as journeymen mechanics.
