

1940 AAA Program To Be Discussed at District Meetings

"Our Work for 1940," is the discussion subject of farm program leaders of Oregon counties at a series of seven district conferences being held at Redmond, Arlington, Grants Pass, Gresham, La Grande, Corvallis and Burns.

County committeemen, secretaries and assistant secretaries from each county office are attending, to meet with state AAA committeemen, AAA fieldmen, commodity specialists and extension service representatives.

Following the district conferences, each county will hold a meeting, with community AAA committeemen and farm supervisors attending.

That there are few changes in the 1940 farm program has been pointed out by the state office at Corvallis.

New Income Tax Law to Be Used

SALEM—A new system of taxing incomes, ordered by the last legislature, will be used in collecting 1939 personal income taxes, now due and payable before April 1.

The legislature repealed the straight 8 per cent tax on intangibles income but substituted a 2 per cent surtax on intangibles to be collected on top of the normal income tax rate assessed against such income. The combined tax, the legislature ruled, is not to exceed 8 per cent less the surtax exemption.

On the regular income, a single person will be allowed \$800 exemption and husband and wife will be exempt \$1500 provided they have lived together for the full year. The tax rate is graduated from 2 to 7 per cent on the entire net income in excess of the exemption and credits for dependents.

A \$300 credit is given for each dependent supported by the taxpayer for the full year. A head of a family is exempt \$1500 plus a credit for each dependent except the first one making the family rate the same as that for a married person. The rate applies to widowers with families.

The exemption for intangibles income is smaller than the straight income rate, with \$800 exempt for married persons and \$500 exempt for single persons. No credit for dependents can be claimed against surtax income and such income includes interest and dividends received.

The legislature changed the graduated scale on payments of income, dropping them so that the first \$500 above the exemption is taxed at 2 per cent and the second \$500 is taxed at 3 per cent. From

\$1000 to \$2000 is taxed at 4 per cent, from \$2000 to \$3000 is taxed at 5 per cent, and from \$3000 to \$4000 is taxed at 6 per cent. All next taxable income in excess of \$4000 is taxed at 7 per cent.

The new rates apply to all returns filed for the calendar year 1939.

Bowling News

During the past three weeks it has been impossible to give standing of teams for the reason many teams failed to complete their scores due to rush of holiday season. However, this condition has now largely been overcome so will try to give the highlights of what has happened during the period of fifth, sixth and seventh weeks.

The fifth week placed Post Office team at head of the list over Safeway. Texaco still holding third place. Gustafsons moved from eighth to fifth place. Quality Market remained undisturbed in fourth place. Row River moved up to ninth place from bottom of list, forcing Irish-Swartz down. Toggery was forced down to eighth place. Standard from sixth to seventh and Union Oil from fifth to sixth.

In the sixth week Safeway goes to top over Postoffice, by 103 pins, placing Post Office in second place. Texaco still holding third. Quality Market still unchanged in fourth place. Gustafsons holds their fifth place. Standard Oil jumped from seventh to sixth place. Irish-Swartz from eighth to seventh place. Union Oil drops from sixth to eighth place. Row River in ninth. Toggery at bottom of the list, as their team has not completed their schedule.

In the seventh week, from January 8 to 12, Safeway still guards top place. Post Office still in second place, 176 pins under Safeway. Quality Market jumps from fourth to third, forcing Texaco to fourth, and is now only 301 pins from top place; Texaco 309 pins from top place with two weeks to go. Gustafson is still guarding fifth place. Standard Oil holding sixth and Row River seventh; Irish-Swartz, eighth. Note correct standing of last three teams listed uncertain for reason Union Oil and Toggery have not completed this week's play.

Standing of teams who have completed their seventh week: Safeway, 19,158; Post Office, 18,982; Quality Market, 18,857; Texaco, 18,849; Gustafsons, 18,727; Standard, 18,554; Row River, 18,300; Irish-Swartz, 18,277.

Morelock still holds high singles for the trophy with 246 pins to his credit, and Quality Market is holding firm their 2836 for the team series' cash prize. With only two more weeks to complete this tournament, several of the teams are making every effort to capture the team series' prize and to attain one of the three top positions in order to share in the sponsor money, totaling \$30 which will be divided 50 per cent or \$15 to first position, \$10 to second, and \$5 to third. The mid-winter tournament will begin immediately following end of present tournament. Practically all teams have expressed desire to enter the mid-winter tournament and several new teams asked to be entered at that time.
