

## Plans Are Made to Organize Bohemia Ski Club Here Soon; Meeting Monday

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## Turkey Growers Discuss Problems On February 2nd

Timely problems of interest to turkey growers will be discussed at an all day meeting to be held in the 4-H club building on the county fair grounds in Eugene on Thursday, February 1, starting at 10:30 a. m. by the Lane County Turkey Growers association cooperating with O. S. Fletcher, county agent.

Speakers will be Dr. E. M. Dickinson, poultry veterinarian of the Oregon State college; N. L. Benning, poultry specialist of the college; J. C. Leedy, secretary of Oregon Turkey Cooperatives, and County Agent Fletcher. Subjects that will be discussed are turkey diseases, green feed for turkeys, brooding and rearing poult, and the turkey outlook and marketing. There will be ample time for growers to present their special problems for discussion.

County Agent Fletcher states that all interested people are invited to attend.

## Too Much Liquor Plus Juggled Funds Equal Cold Check Charge

Berry Holmes, aged 30, until recently employed with the U. S. Engineering crew here, was arrested Tuesday by California officers at Dunsmuir, California, on a warrant charging him with issuing worthless checks here. Holmes is known to have passed at least two worthless checks here, one on the Men's Toggery and one on the Eagle Cigar store. A warrant for his arrest was sworn out by local business men Tuesday morning after he boarded a south bound bus and was taken off the bus at Dunsmuir, where he waived extradition and is being brought back here by the sheriff's department to face the charge of issuing a cold check.

One business man attributed Holmes' act not to wilful intent, but said his action was probably the result of too much liquor. Holmes was said to have juggled his bank account and to have passed at least one bad check in Portland.

## Chas. Putnam Home Destroyed by Fire

The Charles Putnam residence three miles east of town on Mosby Creek, was demolished by fire Monday. The fire, of unknown origin, burned the house and woodshed and all the personal effects of Mr. and Mrs. Putnam except about a half set of dishes. Mrs. Putnam was at home at the time of the fire, but the blaze had gained too much headway to be checked and the family lost everything except the clothing they were wearing. No insurance was carried on the house or the household furniture.

## Organization of Fire Districts Important Says Deputy Hayes

Jack Hayes of Salem, guest speaker at the annual firemen banquet at the Cottage Grove hotel Monday evening praised the Cottage Grove fire department as an efficient organization and said city fire losses here was much less than the average city of its size. The annual fire loss here based on \$100 valuation is less than \$4.00 while the average town in class six, under which Cottage Grove comes, is \$6.00. The above figures were based on fire losses for a period of five years. Mr. Hayes stressed the importance of organizing fire districts in the rural areas and pointed out the benefits to be derived from such districts.

Forty were present at the annual affair, including several former members of the fire department. Preceding the banquet, group singing was led by George Matthews, assisted by Miss Betty Hopper, with Arlene Anderson at the piano.

Several old-time firemen gave short talks in the program following the banquet, which was presided over by Sid Milligan, toastmaster. Among the former members of the fire department speaking were Nels Durham, H. W. Lombard, Andrew Brund, Worth Harvey. Modern fire equipment, plus paved streets, made it much easier to fight fire today, the speakers said.

Fire Chief D. J. Allen spoke on the activities of the department at the present time and of the educational program, which is being conducted in the schools for the prevention of fire.

Clifford Hiner gave a few selections on the accordion concluding the first part of the program. Members of the fire department were hosts to the old time firemen and city officials on this occasion.

## LAMBING SEASON WELL UNDERWAY

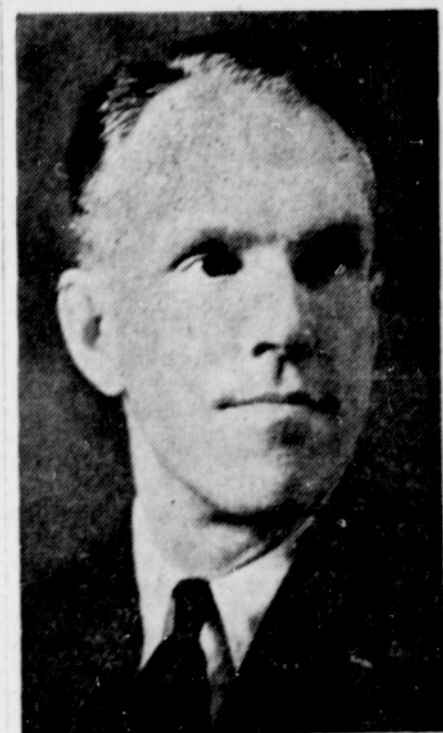

## Many Out of state Cars Visit Oregon

Sixty-five per cent of the tourists visiting Oregon during 1939 came from Washington and California, figures compiled by Earl Snell, secretary of state, revealed today. Of the total of 149,502 visiting cars registered in the state during the year 69,958 were from California and 28,430 were from Washington.

Non-resident registration for the year topped that of 1938 by 10,529 cars, or an increase of 7.58 percent, Snell's figures showed. The year's total was the highest for any year except 1937 when heavy migrations from the mid-west dust bowl swelled Oregon's tourist figures to 155,161 visiting cars.

Next to the two neighboring states on the Pacific coast, the north central states sent the most cars to Oregon, accounting for 13.61 percent of the total. The mountain states accounted for 10.49 per cent, 2.55 percent came from the north Atlantic states, 2.53 percent from the south central states and 1.03 per cent from the south Atlantic states. Foreign cars and those registered from Alaska and the District of Columbia, amounted to 3.98 per cent.

## FUNERAL SERVICES TO BE HELD FRIDAY.

Mrs. Arvilla J. Miller, aged 52, was found dead at her home on the North Pacific highway, just this side of the bridge yesterday afternoon about 4:30 p. m. Mrs. Miller, who had lived alone for several years, was believed to have died some time Monday. Death was probably due to a heart attack. She was found by Mrs. Clifford Lebow and John Schaffer, chief of police. Mrs. Miller's relatives decided to investigate after failure to hear from her in two or three days and when Mrs. Lebow and Officer Schaffer arrived at the residence yesterday they found the house locked and the blinds drawn. Gaining entrance into the home they found Mrs. Miller lying on the bed as if asleep. There was some evidence however that she attempted to get up.

George Miller, husband of the deceased died several years ago. Mrs. Miller had lived here since 1888. Surviving are the mother, Mrs. Eliza McKibben of Prineville, three sisters, Mrs. George Sweet and Mrs. Effie Lebow of Cottage Grove and Mrs. Cora Teeters of Eugene and four brothers, C. H. McKibben and Lew McKibben of Cottage Grove, J. E. McKibben of Eugene and Melvin McKibben of Prineville.

Funeral services will be held at 2:00 p. m. Friday at the Mills Chapel with the Rev. E. M. Tilton, Methodist pastor officiating. Burial will be in the I. O. O. F.-Masonic cemetery.
