WEYERHAUSER FARMS TIMBER BELTS

How the largest privately owned timber tract in the United States is being managed to provide a continuous production of timber and lumber, permanent employment of labor and at the same time a profitable investment for capital was explained in Corvallis Saturday by W. H. Price, manager of the reforestation department of Weyerhaeuser timber company of Tacoma, largest lumber producers in the United States. Price was in Corvallis to make a practical talk to OSC forestry students.

The holdings of the Weyerhaeuser company include extensive areas in the lake states, southern states and Pacific coast, and a large timber area here. This company is claimed to be the only lumber company in the Pacific northwest to attempt lumbering on a sustained yield basis on a large scale.

"Just as we have agricultural farms, we have tree farms and this region will continue to be a tree farm," Price asserted, describing western Oregon and Washington as the largest growing tree farm in the world.
