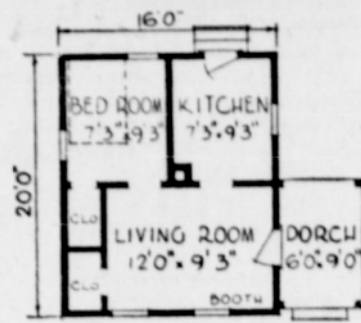
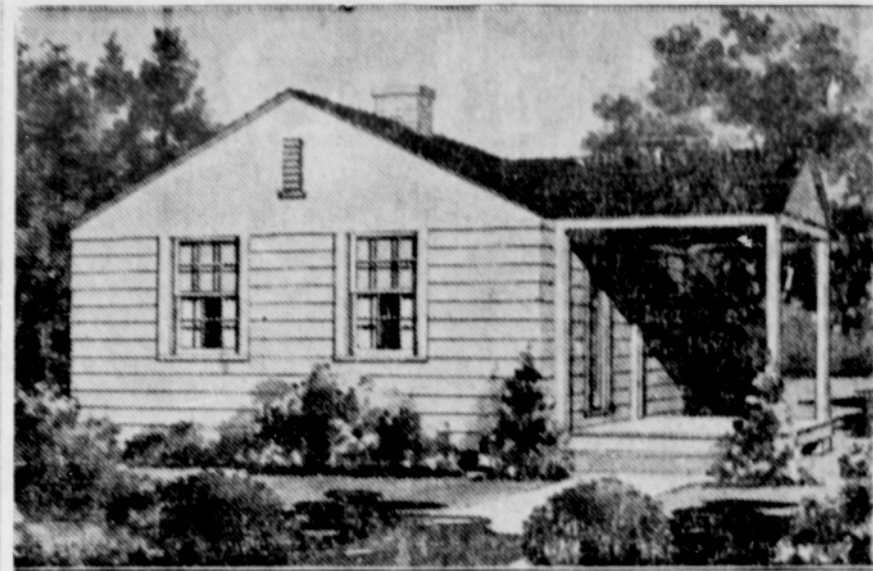
W.R.C. MEETS

The Booth "Cubage Cottage" Design Presented by Western Home Found'n



An interesting idea in home design is presented this week by Western Homes Foundation, in a "cubage cottage" selected from the new "Economy-Built Homes" series of the National Plan service. The list-name of the design is "the Booth." It is for a home that will contain only 3,600 cubic feet. This means a basic house that practically any family can afford to build, with the purpose of making later additions.

"Yet this is a remarkably efficient design for living, in view of the needs and means of many young couples and small families," W. C. Bell, chairman of Western Homes Foundation, points out. "There is, for example, liberal provision of closet space. The roof is pitched to give room for attic storage. The porch may be enclosed and built to form a larger living room. Or this offset can be expanded to provide for kitchen room, a consequent enlargement of the bedroom, and the addition of a bathroom."

"However, the purpose of the designers was to create the most house possible within a limit of 3,600 cubic feet. The national range of home-building costs is from 20 to 30 cents per cubic foot. At the highest figure the Booth would cost less than \$1,100; at the lowest, \$720. This cost-range represents what the designers were shooting at, within a cubage limit of 3,600 cubic feet. And this is why the Foundation presents it as a 'cubage cottage'. It is an example of what the building industry is equipped to supply in 1940 to meet the need for 'starting homes'."

Working plans and specifications for the Booth may be had on a cost basis through retail lumber dealers or from Western Homes Foundation, 364 Stuart Building, Seattle, Washington.

Safeway Installs New Meat, Groc'y Fixtures

Safeway grocery at the corner of 6th and Main, the first of the week began the installation of new furniture and fixtures throughout the store. Included in the improvements are a Birkenwald meat case, a twenty-five foot display case, which will give the meat department ten feet of additional display. Also a larger cooler or storage room was added giving the meat market approximately twice the storage space.

New furniture and fixtures have been added in the grocery department, including new shelving, new display counters and a new checking stand. When completed the arrangement will facilitate shopping by giving more aisle space as well as a more convenient arrangement in the display of groceries.
