Death Takes Mrs. E. Whitney Tues.

Mrs. Ethel Whitney, aged 45, a resident of this section for the past four years, died at the family home three miles southeast of here Tuesday afternoon at 5:30 p. m. Funeral services are being held this afternoon at 2:30 p. m. at the Mills chapel with the Rev. E. L. Kechley, Christian minister, officiating. Interment was made in Masonic-I.O.O.F. cemetery.

NO USE TO GET SCARED. WASHINGTON (Special) —

While European nations are taking hitches in their belts with stringent food-rationing restrictions, the Department of Commerce completed an inventory of the food situation over here, making findings which strengthen America's ranking as the world's

best-fed nation. Uncle Sam's cupboard is far from bare, as is shown by the "box score" on the nation's food resources for the current year, in terms of amount per person available. We have a billion bushels of wheat, which figures out to 231 pounds for every man, woman and child in the country . . . poultry, about 19 pounds . . . other meat, 131 pounds . . . fresh vegetables, 95 pounds . . . white potatoes, 135, and sweet potatoes, 26 pounds . . . butter, almost 17 pounds . . . fresh fruits, 148 pounds per person. The situation reflected in these graphic statistics probably accounts for the reluctance noted on the part of wholesalers in Chicago last week to place large advance orders for canned goods. There seems to be no grounds for fearing any runaway price rise, nor for heavy stocking up on food inventories.

Paradoxical History

U. S. Grant

Certainly no one would predict from the preceding years of his life that U. S. Grant would eventually become president of the United States of America. His interests and his success in business ventures did not indicate any such future. One might say that most of the accomplishments for which he is famous occurred not because but in spite of himself.

Even the name by which he is remembered is not his own. Although baptized Hiram Ulysses, his family and friends called him Ulysses. The government official who appointed him to West Point thought his first name was Ulysses and his middle name Simpson, the name of his mother's family. West Point officials were notified of the mistake by the new cadet but for some reason did not correct it.

The first forty years of Grant's life were far from fruitful ones. He made many attempts to succeed in different occupations but all were in vain. The only encouraging progress that he made in those years was his beginning upon an army career; even this wasted into nothing. As a farmer, upon land which cost him nothing, he failed utterly. Then he turned to real estate dealing and fared no better.

It is no reflection upon his future accomplishments that many who knew him considered Grant a broken man. This is illustrated by the fact that his younger brother gave Ulysses a job in his store and placed a value upon the services of the future president of the United States of America at \$15 a week.

Politically, Grant was comparatively unknown until he was nominated for president. He was approached by a few leading Demo-

crats to run as their nominee. However, he had quarreled with Johnson and this not only brought him into the political limelight but into contact with the Republican party. This party completely won him over and he was elected the highest civic office in the nation.
