Feed Loans Are Available to the Lane Co. Farmers

Emergency crop and feed loans for 1940 are available to farmers in Lane county, and applications for these loans are now being received at Eugene by V. N. Freeman, field supervisor of the emergency crop and feed loan section of the Farm Credit Administration.

This early opening of the loan program in Lane county is part of a plan recently announced by the Farm Credit Administration whereby emergency crop and feed loans are being made available immediately in all areas where farming conditions are seriously affected this year by drought or flood.

These loans will be made, as in the past, only to farmers whose cash requirements are small and who cannot obtain a loan from any other source, including production credit associations, banks, or other private concerns or individuals.

Paradoxical History

Hitler At Court

In the drab, noisy, crowded, northwestern section of Berlin stands a three-story, brick building, the Courts of Justice, where all criminal cases are tried. In the years before the present Nazi regime these courts were the scene of ceaseless conflicts between young workmen of the Nazi Storm Troops and their opponents, the Social Communist "Red Front." Leaders on both sides were constantly urging their followers on with the result being numerous collisions, conflicts and casualties, many of them fatal. Heavy penalties proved of no avail in the suppression of these. In an effort to get at the underlying cause of all the trouble leaders upon both sides were called into the court.

This action brought Adolf Hitler to the front upon the side of the Storm Troopers. His unemotional, firm, and straightforward manner that day at court offers a striking contrast to his present day methods of maintaining a point. He admitted that his party was out for power but that it abhorred the use of force and that it would resort only to legal means. The legal course did carry him into power but once there he apparently forgot it.

As Hitler, dressed in a neat blue-jacket suit, left the court he passed by a statue. Symbolizing the justice administered inside a bronze lion stood trampling on the head of a snake. I wonder if it is still there.
