RELIGION INTEREST HIGH AT U. O.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 4th (Special)—The Presbyterian church, with 15 per cent, leads all others in religious preferences of University of Oregon students, according to statistics released today by C. L. Constance, assistant registrar. Figures were taken from registration card data.

Second, with 10.3 percent, was the Episcopal church, closely followed by the Methodist, with 10.2 percent. The Roman Catholic faith is preferred by 8.2 percent, while 1.3 percent are of Jewish faith.

Approximately three-fourths of the student body entered a church preference on the cards. A large number of the students are active in religious work on the campus, and take a prominent part in the Y.M.C.A., Y.W.C.A., Wesley House, Westminster House, and other organizations.

BOWLING INSTRUCTIONS TO LADIES FREE

Since a number of ladies have expressed an interest in learning to bowl, Clarence Leinhard, manager of the Grove alleys, said yesterday that arrangements would be made to give free instructions to prospective bowlers and that the management hoped to inaugurate a ladies bowling tournament soon. FLAX ALLOTMENT INCREASE

County flax growers will be permitted to produce more flax this year and still draw a federal subsidy. Such was the unofficial announcement made known yesterday morning. Last year flax growers drew a subsidy of \$7.50 per ton. This year it is \$6.50 and next year it will be \$5.50.

Tax Statements to Be Ready Soon

Tax statements will be sent out from the sheriff's office within a few days. The 1940 Lane county rolls were turned over yesterday afternoon by Welby Stevens, assessor. First quarter taxes will be delinquent March 15th.

The total amount due and collectible this year is \$1,731,482.95, which is more than \$200,000 less than the total on the 1939 tax roll. The amount then was \$1,947,712.18. The sum of \$319.15 has been collected by the assessor.

Totals on the roll in different funds for this year are as follows: State and county, \$714,739.70; special school, \$488,640.53; county high school tuition, \$43,821.63; union high school \$152,098.37; special city, \$315,321.32; special forest patrol, \$15,329.26; rodent tax, \$203.88; water districts and fire protection district, \$4,543.88.

UNION OIL TO CELEBRATE 50th ANNIVERSARY

Last Sunday was the 50th anniversary of the beginning of Oregon's worst flood in recorded history, the 1890 Willamette freshet, according to word from Portland. Rains that started on January 28 and continued for three days in February fattened the placid river into a torrent that brought hen-houses and river docks from Eugene and Salem and piled them against buildings of Portland's flooded Front street.
