

Winter Bowling Is Going Strong

The Cottage Grove Lions invaded the Eugene High Axemen's stronghold only to lose their third straight district 7 league tilt 29 to 25, Tuesday, February 6.

The Axemen jumped into an early 16-7 lead but the Lions on baskets by Langston and Smith, closed the gap to 16-15 at half-time.

Smith, Lion forward, opened the second half with a one-handed push shot from the corner to put the Lions into a 17-16 lead. The advantage changed several times during the third quarter with the Axemen on top at the end 22-21. They held the lead throughout the remainder of the game as the Lions were guilty of several bad passes.

Marshall and Frye carried the scoring load for the Axemen with 10 points each.

McKibben and Dugan played good floor games for the Lions with Langston taking high point honors with 10 points.

The Lions made good on four out of 16 from the charity line while the Axemen converted for three out of 11. The Lions attempted 34 shots from the field, converting nine for an average of .265—their highest average this season.

Two Bohemia Mines Sold During Week

Two mines in the Bohemia district, the Combination and the Star, have changed hands. Papers are in escrow for the sale of these properties to G. D. McCutcheon of Vancouver, Washington, David vonNeeda, owner, reported yesterday. It is understood the new owner plans to erect a mill at the Combination as soon as a road is completed into the property. The size of the mill, it is understood, will depend on the engineer's report, which is to be made shortly. The mill will probably be of fifty tons capacity.

A CCC crew last fall did considerable work on a road leading to the Combination and have recently been at work on the project, but it is not known how much additional work remains to be done.

SNOW IN HIGH HILLS

With lowering temperatures over western Oregon Tuesday, snow fell in the high altitudes and continued to fall yesterday. Snow started falling at Bohemia Tuesday morning and continued during the two-day period. How much fell could not be determined since there has been little or no passing, but the snow caps were visible from valley points. Over two inches of snow had fallen on the McKenzie pass up to yesterday morning. Practically all the western part of the state was drenched in rain and a high wind whipped the coast, reaching a velocity of 45 miles per hour Monday in the Florence section. Highway crews were kept busy clearing the coast and connecting highways of debris. A nine-foot tide was reported in the Siuslaw section Tuesday.

Rainfall, however, to the east appeared to be lighter than here. Yesterday afternoon at the Rujada station twenty-two miles to the east, total precipitation in February was reported at 2.97 inches. The January rainfall measured 3.5 inches, the lightest January fall since the weather station was established there twelve years ago.

City Indebtedness Reduced \$24,500

If the city can maintain its present rate of liquidating its bonded indebtedness, the indebtedness should be wiped from the slate within a few years with a corresponding lower tax rate, depending of course on whether further obligations are voted. During 1939 the city retired \$20,500 in bonds, purchasing \$4000 of its own bonds, thus retiring a total of \$24,500 of bonded indebtedness and reducing the bonded indebtedness from \$204,000 to \$179,500. The city now owns \$25,500 of its own bonds, including \$9,000 of water bonds and \$16,500 of improvement bonds.
