MOTT ON COMMITTEE

(By Federal Service Syndicate) Washington, D. C.—Congressman James W. Mott, 1st District of Oregon has been named member of a special subcommittee to study effect of New Deal policies and other factors on imports and exports of agricultural commodities.

The Mott subcommittee will attempt, as part of a republican congressional probe of the whole agricultural situation, to "secure a clear vista of the reasons back of the governmental policies which have allowed a flood of agricultural imports to flow into our markets to an extent where they have displaced the production from tens of millions of American acres, in a time when our farmers are being severely limited in their crop acreages."

ANGEL, PROTESTS FORESTRY SHIFT

WASHINGTON — Rep. Homer D. Angell, R., Ore., had protested to President Roosevelt the transfer of the forest service from the department of agriculture to the department of interior.

In a letter to the president, Angell said that the people of Oregon are "very much interested" in the possible change and that they had made no complaints against the present administration of the service. He said that over 50 per cent of Oregon's payroll comes either directly or indirectly from forest industries.

Pontiac Sales Set Record for January

Retail deliveries of new Pontiac cars set an all-time high for any January in Pontiac history with a total of 13,671 units, according to D. U. Bathrick, general sales manager of Pontiac Motor Division. This was a gain of 32 per cent over January, 1939.

Deliveries during the last ten days were 5,437 compared with 3,661 for the same period last year, and 5,205 for the second ten days this year, which Bathrick points out is quite noteworthy considering the unusually severe weather which prevailed in many parts of the country. . . a further indication that the automobile business is becoming more and more of a year round business.

Inventories of new cars in dealers' stocks are only normal, it is held. Unfilled orders for new cars at the end of the month were 4.4 times greater than at the same time last year.

Used car sales also set an all-time record for January with a total of 28,717 or a gain of 20.3 per cent over January of 1939, which is very satisfactory, Bathrick said.

WINTER HORSE DISEASE EVIDENTLY BOTULISM

The animal division of the department of agriculture at Salem has been conducting experimental work with a winter horse disease that appears in the foothills districts of the Willamette valley. In all cases investigated by Dr. E. R. Derflinger, one of the assistant veterinarians, this malady has responded to botulinus antitoxin issued with stimulants and purgatives.

This winter disease or staggers is usually found during February and March and in cases observed oat hay is being fed more often than not. Bundled oat hay seems to be more dangerous, especially if cut from an unevenly ripened field.

Some cures result from treatment of purgatives together with succulent feeds such as carrots, potatoes, apples and turnips but in severe types of this infection cures are not effected without use of the antitoxin. Treatment must be started early for good results, the department warns.
