"My job is to talk to young people on the problem of alcohol," stated W. Ray Breg, executive secretary of the Allied Youth, from Washington, D. C., who spoke to the student body Monday. "We stand for the freedom of youth from alcoholic beverages."

"Young people come to high school," he went on, "with the idea that they are no longer to be carried around in their parents' arms but are young citizens of the world."

"Most young people will have to make a choice in a split second of whether or not they are going to take a drink when asked by their host at a party or outing," explained Mr. Breg.

"J. Edgar Hoover said that 19 per cent of the crimes committed by young people under voting age is caused by liquor," stated Mr. Breg.

Mr. Breg held a conference after his talk with young people interested in the Allied Youth movement and a committee was selected to organize an allied youth club in the high school.

Everett Nichols, concert whistler, gave the second period U. S. history class a talk on the Yucatan, February 14. Mr. Nichols recently returned to the United States and brought with him many carvings of heads from stone. He described many ancient ruins and particularly the largest amphitheater in the world which is located in the Yucatan. It is a mile long and half a mile wide. Between 500,000 and 900,000 people can stand it in at one time. Mr. Nichols made the students laugh when he described and imitated the walk of the most vicious tribe in the world. It is a tribe in the interior of the Yucatan. They are three feet high, weigh 150 pounds and are very bow-legged. "I have been in Africa, Arabia, India and elsewhere, but I'd rather be in the Yucatan," said Mr. Nichols in closing.

"Seldom have I ever given a performance for a mixed group such as this," explained Ernest Nichols of California, professional whistler, to the grade school and high school students, February 14 in the gymnasium. Mr. Nichols said he thought Carrie Jacobs Bond one of the greatest of composers. He whistled two of her compositions, "I Love You Truly," and "Just a Wearyin' for You."

The councils and advisors of the boys' federation and the girls' league met for a joint summer Monday evening. During the dinner, subjects of discussion concerning both groups such as noon recreation, copying of other students' work, and care of the new high school building were brought up. Committees were appointed to take action on the topics discussed. Gladys Lemley, president of the girls' league, acted as leader. In closing, superintendent Ferrin explained the library of the new school to the group, appealing to them to realize the value of the equipment of the new school.

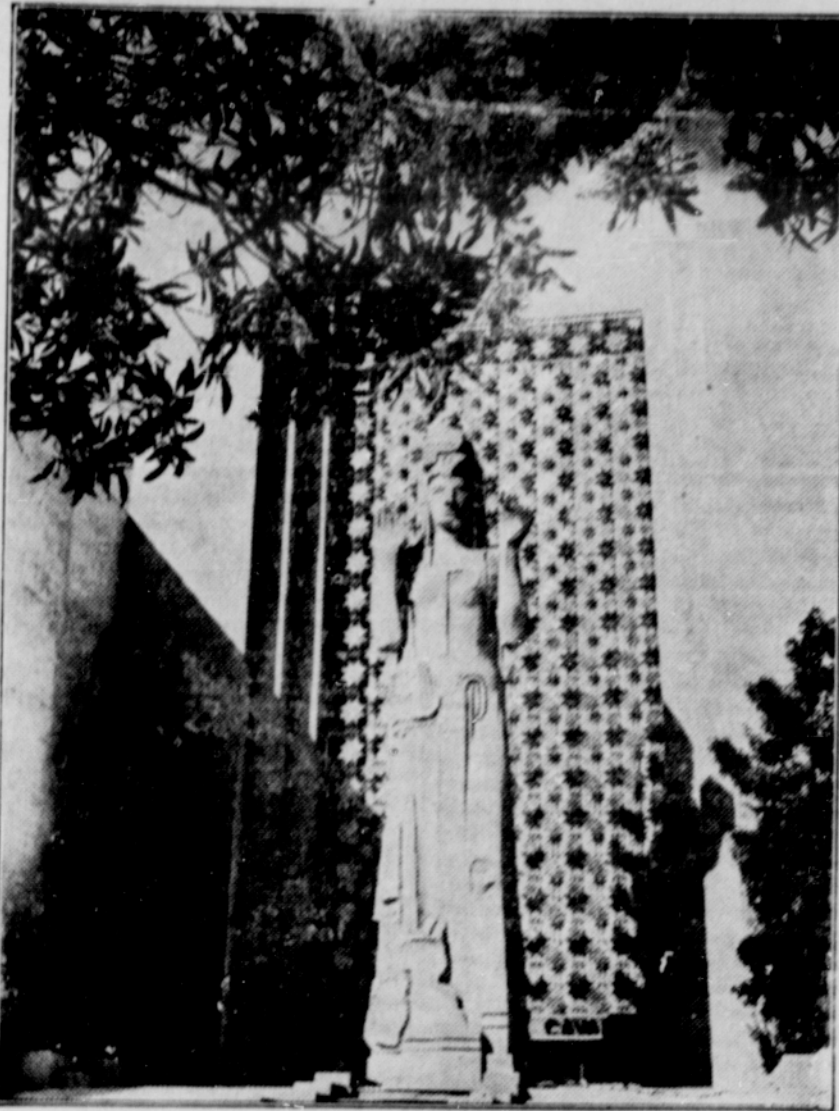

Ralph H. Cate, prominent Portland civic leader, partyworker and businessman, filed late yesterday with Secretary of State Earl Snell for the office of republican national committeeman.

Cate who is a native of Portland where he was born in 1891 absorbed republican doctrine under the tutoring of his father, the late Judge W. M. Cate, while attending Portland grade and high schools and the University of Oregon where he graduated in 1913. He finished his education by taking law at Harvard and returned to Oregon to join his father's firm. In school he joined the Phi Gamma Delta which he has since served as national officer. He is a past president of the University of Oregon Alumni association. He is a member of numerous fraternal and civic organizations and was president of the highly successful 1938 Rose Festival.

GAS PRICE MAY RISE, MOTOR MAGAZINE SAYS

The fear that the American motorist may be called upon to bear an additional load due to costs of foreign wars is voiced in an editorial in the current issue of the Oregon Motorist, official publication of the Oregon State Motor association. The editorial points out that the loss of foreign markets to the petroleum industry as a result of blockades, ocean losses by sinking, and neutrality legislation, means that the domestic petroleum market is going to have to bear a larger and larger share of the costs of "being in business." The editorial says, "... the domestic market today is carrying an ever-larger load—one so heavy that despite every effort being put forth by producing oil companies to keep prices down it may demand increased gasoline and oil prices."

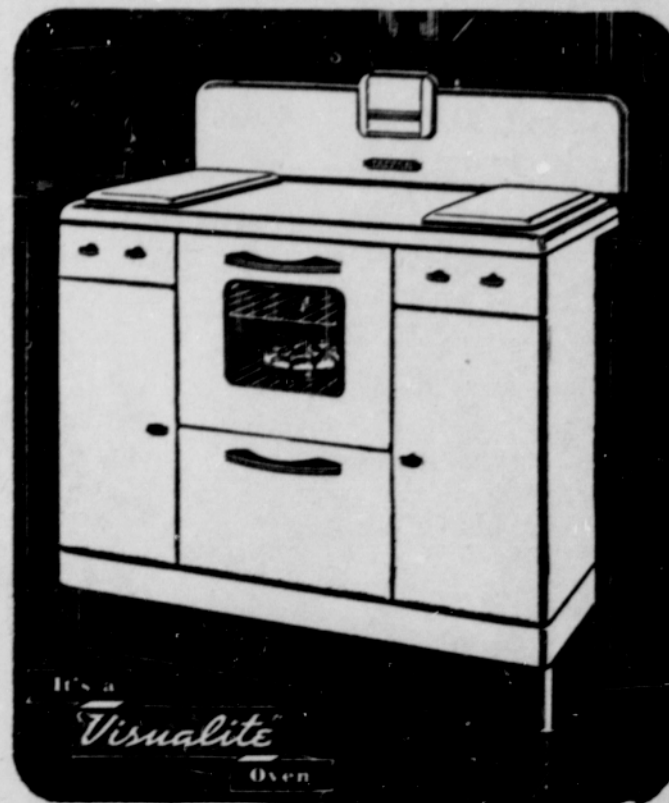
A chimney fire broke out at the Frank Keller home Friday evening but was put out before doing serious damage.
