Returned Missionaries to Show Natural Color Pictures Sunday Eve



Church goers of this vicinity have a rare treat in store for them Sunday evening when the Rev. and Mrs. Cecil Jackson, returned missionaries of Singapore, will appear and show natural color pictures of the Malay states and the Malayan jungle at the high school gymnasium. The coming of the Rev. and Mrs. Jackson is sponsored by seven local churches, the Presbyterian church, the Church of the Nazarene, the Baptist church, the Assembly of God, the Methodist church, the Christian church and the Free Methodist church.

The Rev. and Mrs. Jackson have spent thirteen years in the Straits Settlements and the Malay states, where their three children were born. They established a church housed in a beautiful building together with a Bible school in Singapore and a mission on the island.

Of the picture to be shown, we learn:

This beautiful technicolor picture was made in the heart of the Malayan jungle where the wild Sakai tribesman hunts with his primitive blowpipe and Sakai women cook rice in bamboo. Rev. Jackson is also seen going through swamp and jungle on elephant back and crossing a large river on a bamboo raft. A group of these wild tribespeople transformed by the power of God provide the real thrill of this picture.

Heathen Religions was taken at considerable personal hazard, Rev. Jackson being switched and punched while photographing Hindu ceremonial rites. This picture shows idol worshippers bowing down before great gods of stone and clay. Hindu devotees' jaws are pierced with steel arrows, the points protruding on both sides of the face. Spikes are thrust into the back and hooks with weights are pinned to the flesh. With bare feet, men run and dance through coals of fire in an attempt to purge away their sins. All in technicolor!

Building for God in Singapore—This picture has thrilled and astounded large audiences everywhere. Women carry heavy steel bars and hardwood timber and women mix concrete to help build the most beautiful chapel and Bible school in all Malaya. In colorful native costumes several hundred Christians of many nationalities worship the Lord on a common plane. Members of the Ladies Fellowship Circle are given awards for faithful Bible study. Transformed believers receive Christian baptism in the beautiful setting of the South Seas.

The Rev. and Mrs. Jackson will conduct services Monday evening at the Assembly of God church.

Golden Gate to Be West's Best Fair

TREASURE ISLAND, February 28.—Backed by an appropriation of \$350,000 by the state legislature, bringing California's financial participation to nearly \$1,000,000, the 1940 season of the Golden Gate International Exposition will beyond doubt be the finest fair the west has ever produced.

This was the unanimous opinion expressed by Exposition officials when appraised of the new appropriation.

Under the terms of the measure setting up the new finances, the sum of \$100,000 is to be "earmarked" to aid county exhibits, and a further sum of \$65,000 is set aside for special events.

"With this new appropriation added to funds remaining from last year's state fund, Treasure Island is now in position to assure the creation of a host of new features," said President Marshall Dill.

"The commendable action of the legislature in making this investment, which will be repaid many fold, will be of immeasurable benefit in many ways. The confidence of the state's lawmakers, as evidenced by their action, will prove a vital factor in securing many new exhibits, features and participants for the 1940 season."

Equally enthusiastic was Federal Commissioner George Creel who stated, in a wire to President Dill:

"Now that California has officially, through its legislature, shown its faith in the 1940 exposition, the way has been made clear for increased out-of-state, federal and foreign participation."
