

## Fair Outlook In Sight for Spring Crops in General

The outlook for spring sown field crops and vegetables in general is somewhat better than a year ago, according to extensive information and data contained in the annual outlook review of this important group of farm commodities just published for distribution in Oregon by the agricultural extension service. The principal basis for some improvement in the market outlook is the prospect of more moderate supplies of the products.

Domestic demand for farm products is expected to continue on a relatively high level during the 1940-41 marketing season, if the war in Europe continues another year or more, but foreign demand has been curtailed owing to the war, and farm costs are expected to be somewhat higher in 1940 than in 1939.

Despite prospects for a wheat crop scarcely large enough for domestic needs, no shortage of wheat is expected owing to heavy stocks of wheat carried over. On the whole, present conditions indicate that reserves will still be well above average on July 1, 1941, but probably around two-thirds as large as on July 1, 1940.

Ample supplies of feed grains and hay are expected for the 1940-41 feeding season in the country as a whole. The pig crop of 1940 is expected to be much larger than in 1938 but probably somewhat smaller than the record crop of 1939. Milk cow numbers are expected to increase as the number of heifers is greater than required for replacements, and moderate increase may occur in beef cattle and sheep if feed and range conditions are near average this year.

Present prospects indicate increased production of potatoes, flaxseed and beans. The Oregon forage crop seed industry is expected to continue to expand with considerable increases in winter field peas, hairy vetch and chewing fescue grass seed, particularly.

The truck crop outlook is better than a year ago as surplus stocks of canned vegetables from the heavy pack of 1938 have been reduced to more nearly normal proportions than a year ago. Production of vegetables for manufacture in 1940 is somewhat uncertain, however.

Acres of all commercial truck crops for marketing fresh is expected to be slightly larger than in 1939, although producers of late celery and onions may not follow the general trend. Late onion production in 1939 was especially heavy owing to high yields and a larger acreage than usual.

## Bicycles Cause of 78 Percent of the Traffic Accidents During 1939

In 78 per cent of the fatal accidents involving motor vehicles and bicycles during the year 1939, the bicycle riders were engaged in some imprudent action at the time the accident occurred, it was revealed by Earl Snell, secretary of state.

These unsafe actions included riding two or more abreast, riding double on one bicycle, cutting across the path of traffic suddenly, failing to observe traffic signals and signs, hitching rides on moving vehicles and riding on the wrong side of the street.

"Every person who rides a bicycle should remember that in the eyes of Oregon law, bicycles are regarded as vehicles and as such are subject to the same traffic regulations as other vehicles," Snell declared. "This means that bicycle riders must stop at stop signs, observe traffic and right-of-way laws that apply to traffic control."

"Young bicycle riders frequently forget to give proper arm signals when making turns and they often ride several abreast, thus causing the riders to be out in the path of the faster moving automobile traffic. These practices must be eliminated if we are to reduce the bicycle death toll."

## Lane County Levy For 1940 Is Less

Tax levies in 1940 for Lane county were announced Saturday by Welby Stevens, county assessor. The total county levy for all purposes is \$1,734,698.57, against \$1,948,532.87 a year ago, representing a decrease of \$213,834.30. County valuations were \$599,926 more than the preceding year. The tax levy in mills was 22.3 in 1939 and 17.0 this year, a reduction of over five mills.

City levies were: Cottage Grove, 69; Creswell, 35.9; Eugene, 55; Florence, 54.1; Junction City, 48.5; Oakridge, 55.9; Springfield, 81.1. Aside from Springfield, Cottage Grove has the highest tax rate of any municipality in the county, however city officials have pointed out that lower valuations here usually more than make up for the difference in the average rate.

County schools will get the major portion of every tax dollar paid into the county treasury. The schools will get an average of 54.82 cents and in 1939 the school got even 54 cents and in 1938 the ratio was 49.17 cents. Outside of the schools, the municipalities will get the next biggest cut, with an average of 18.64 from every dollar.

## FSC to Purchase 2500 Tons Prunes

The Federal Surplus Commodities corporation will purchase from prune growers in Western Oregon and Washington an additional 2500 tons of natural-condition dried prunes, according to announcement received by O. S. Fletcher, county agent. Actual deliveries will be made during the period beginning March 11, 1940, and ending April 15, 1940.

The price and size of the new purchase will remain the same as in the previous purchase program. The grade requirements for natural-condition dried prunes will be the same as at present except that 5 per cent additional tolerance will be allowed for scab. This is principally for the benefit of localities where excessive scab is a factor.

The FSC is mailing offer forms and purchase announcements to all growers who participated in the first program. Any grower who did not file an application under the previous program may obtain information and proper forms and file his offer with County Agent Fletcher. Offers must be filed on or before March 9, 1940, and deliveries will commence as soon as possible after that date.

The FSC is just completing final deliveries on the purchase of 5000 tons of natural-condition dried prunes. The new purchase will make a total of 7500 tons of surplus prunes which will be purchased by the FSC from growers in Western Washington and Oregon. All prunes purchased by the FSC are distributed to state welfare administrations throughout the United States and its possessions for distribution to the needy and unemployed.

Lane county growers offered 246 tons last December.
