COTTAGE CHEESE

In scratching around for ideas for Lenten menus don't overlook the possibilities to be found in cottage cheese. A most versatile food is cottage cheese or pot cheese, farmers' cheese, schmeir-kase, or call it what you will, and deserves a more prominent place in the family meal plans than it sometimes gets.

For one thing, it supplies the much needed proteins for muscle building and upkeep. Because of this it can be used effectively as a meat substitute. Cottage cheese supplies, too, the minerals, calcium and phosphorus needed for strong bones and teeth. It is also high in vitamin content and supplies all the vitamins in the "solids-not-fat" part of milk, although cream is usually added to cottage cheese.

Cottage cheese may be served just as you buy it or as a sundae with jelly or preserves. Raspberry jam is especially good with cottage cheese. Or it may be added to colorful salads, combined in tasty sandwiches, or baked in many healthful desserts. And with all its being a nourishing and versatile food it is also an economical one and better yet—if you are watching your weight—low in calories. This Pineapple Cheese Cake is really a masterpiece, and the Bread Pudding is easy to make and is a tasty dessert.

Pineapple Cheese Cake

2/3 cup graham crackers
1 1/2 cups creamed cottage cheese
1/3 cup cake flour
3 tablespoons cornstarch
1/4 teaspoon salt
4 eggs, separated
1/2 cup crushed pineapple, drained
1 cup sugar
Butter bottom of a 9-inch spring form pan. Sprinkle 1/2 cup of the cracker crumbs evenly over bottom. Rub cottage cheese through fine sieve. Mix with the flour, cornstarch, salt and beaten egg yolks. Boil pineapple juice and sugar together until syrup spins a thread (230 deg.) and pour over beaten egg whites, beating constantly. Combine cheese mixture, drained pineapple and egg white mixture; when thoroughly blended, pour into the pan. Sprinkle remaining crumbs over top. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes, until cake is firm and a silver knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serve cold. Serves 6 to 8.

Bread Pudding

2 cups diced bread
1 cup creamed cottage cheese
1 1/2 cups milk
1/4 cup melted butter
2 eggs, beaten
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon lemon rind
Combine bread with cottage cheese, milk and melted butter; add the other ingredients and pour into a buttered casserole. Bake at 325 degrees for one hour, or until a sharp knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Serve hot or cold with cream. Serves 6

Golden Tide Wins 3rd Title

The University High Golden Tide rolled into its third district 7 league title and a spot in the state tournament with a 43-23 victory over the Cottage Grove quintet, at McArthur court Friday, February 23.

Coach Ray Hendrickson of the Golden Tide was taking no chances as he kept his regulars in the fray with a 20-point lead until the final minute and a half of the game.

The Tide was decidedly on with Chuck D'Autremont tallying eight long howitzers from near the center line and Don Plath adding four more. The Lions, playing on the glass backboards of McArthur court for the first time, were off in their shooting.

The fast-breaking Tide piled up a 14-1 lead in the early minutes of the first stanza. Smith connected on one hander from the key to bring the score to 14-3 at the end of the quarter. The Lions held the champions on even terms in the second quarter, the half ending 25-13.

Plath tallied four points on one play to start the third quarter as he dropped in a set-up and then collected two gifters on George Dugan's foul. Plath canned another howitzer and Gatlin a one-hander from the side and a gift to push the Tide into a 34-13 lead. The quarter ended 38-17.

Don Plath with 17, was high point man for the evening, followed by De'Autremont with 16. Peck led the Lion scorers with six points.

The University high B team routed the Lion cubs 35-19. Moyer of the Tide raced the scorers with 13 points.
