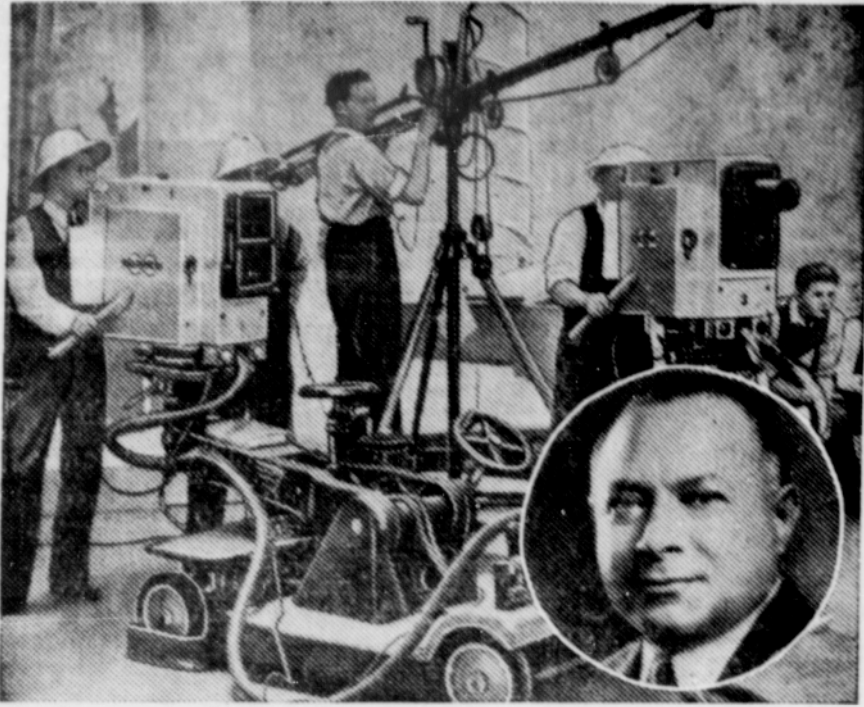


HIGH SCHOOL BOY TO GET \$4000 RADIO SCHOLARSHIP

THE outstanding radio scientist of the future will be given a flying start toward his goal through the award of a \$4000 college scholarship next fall, according to a plan announced today by David Sarnoff, President of the Radio Corporation of America.

Realizing that tomorrow's radio engineering talent is to be found among the boys who are now in the senior classes of high schools, Mr. Sarnoff intends to find the student who is best fitted by brains and natural ability to succeed in a scientific career. To this end, a competition is being offered this week through the Principals of 17,000 high schools throughout the United States to students who are qualified by high scholastic stand-

ings. Ten preliminary winners will be selected on the basis of their ratings in this examination. All of them will be brought to New York

next August at the expense of the company, and will spend a month in thorough inspections of RCA and NBC engineering facilities. The judges will select one of the ten boys as the final winner of the \$4000 tuition and maintenance scholarship. The others will receive cash awards of \$100 each in addition to full expenses of the trip, which will include visits to many scientific exhibits at the New York World's Fair.

Mr. Sarnoff, who himself rose unaided from messenger boy to the head of the mammoth RCA organization, believes that the competition will bring to the fore a boy of outstanding ability and that the scholarship will enable him to lay a solid foundation for a successful career. It is expected that several local high school seniors will be able to qualify for the examination which will be given on April 23rd.

Thaxton Motor Service Is Appointed Distributor for the New 1940 Hudson

The Thaxton Motor Service has been appointed local distributors for the Hudson automobile, according to an announcement made by the Hudson Motor Co. Monday and is displaying a new 1940 model at the Thaxton Motor Service building on Fifth street, a half block off Main. A cordial invitation is extended the public to call and inspect this new model sedan and see the completely equipped car that retails here for less than \$1,000. Features in the 1940 Hudson are not found in any other car under \$1,400. Mr. Thaxton declared in talking of the outstanding values Hudson today offers in all classes of cars manufactured.

In describing the new Hudsons, Mr. Thaxton said: "Sweeping improvements occur throughout the entire 1940 line. Particular emphasis is placed on a new entry in the lowest price field, the new Hudson Six in which new features, new fabrics and a new style of upholstery make their appearance in addition to engineering advancements in performance, front-end spring suspension, riding comfort and roadability never before offered in this price class."

The new 1940 Hudson Six, driven by John R. Cobb, British speed king, and holder of the world's land speed record of 368.85 miles per hour, recently captured 81 new Class D, and unlimited closed car records on the famous Bonneville Salt Flats in Utah. The records range from one mile to a 20,000-mile endurance run made by the Hudson Six in 12 days at an average speed of 70.58 miles per hour, which is farther and faster than any car, regardless of size or price, has ever traveled this distance under official observation.

Hudson Super-Six and Eight

Also spotlighted for 1940 is a wholly new type of low priced straight eight. This new Hudson Eight, which delivers more than one horsepower for every inch of wheelbase, is a further development of Hudson's high power-to-weight engineering practice and is said to attain standards of performance and economy new in the industry.

Another American Automobile Association record breaker, this new Hudson Eight, also driven by John R. Cobb, recently broke the class C record for closed cars for the Flying Mile by averaging 93.8 miles per hour in two directions on the Bonneville course. Another Class C record for ten miles was smashed by this phenomenal new Hudson Eight at an average speed of 92.189 miles per hour. All records were timed by the same equipment and American Automobile Association Contest Board observers which certified Cobb's international Flying Mile record.

The complete line comprises the Hudson Six DeLuxe in the lowest price field, with 92 horsepower, mounted on 113-inch wheelbase; the new Hudson Super-Six and Hudson Eight in the low price field with 102 and 128 horsepower respectively, both mounted on 118-inch wheelbase, and the new Country Club Sedans with both six and eight cylinder motors of 102 and 128 horsepower, mounted on 125-inch wheelbase.

All the new Hudsons have been strikingly restyled and the new characteristic front-end design has been maintained throughout the entire line. Longer, lower lines characterize all models and running boards are optional as the buyer prefers, even in the lowest priced models.

UO STUDENTS WANT MATES TO BE COMPANIONS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON.—Students may have forgotten all about "companionate marriage" which was a topic of conversation a few years ago, but University of Oregon co-eds want their husbands to be congenial, understanding, have a sense of humor and mutual interests, a survey just conducted here shows.

The project, carried out under the direction of Dr. Wilbur S. Hulin, assistant professor of psychology, showed that 60 percent of the girls put these qualities, those of companionship, first in their qualifications for a husband. High ideals, character and intelligence were rated first by 27 percent, while only 13 percent were interested primarily in ambition, success or income of the hoped-for mates.

In most cases, co-eds listed social virtues such as personality and business ability, as second choices.

The men want wives who will be real companions, since 53 percent listed these qualities first. Personality and attractiveness were rated at the top by 38 percent, while only nine percent were greatly interested in housekeeping ability or finances. For second choice, most men preferred beauty, charm and personality.

NEW SPRAYING BULLETINS FOR ORCHARDISTS

With the advent of the spring spraying season, the Oregon State college extension service has issued its annual spray programs, both for Oregon stone fruits and for apple and pear orchards. Recommendations contained in these two spray program bulletins, No. 538 and No. 539 respectively, are the result of annual conferences participated in by extension and research men from the central station, branch stations, and other counties.

The stone fruit spray bulletin describes 15 of the more common stone fruit insects, and eight diseases. Both bulletins include information about handling spray materials and conclude with detailed charts giving, in handy form, time of application, spray material to use, and proper strength for the control of various insects and pests.

While some changes have been made in these programs over previous years, the recommendations are essentially the same in most respects as those contained in the 1939 bulletins.

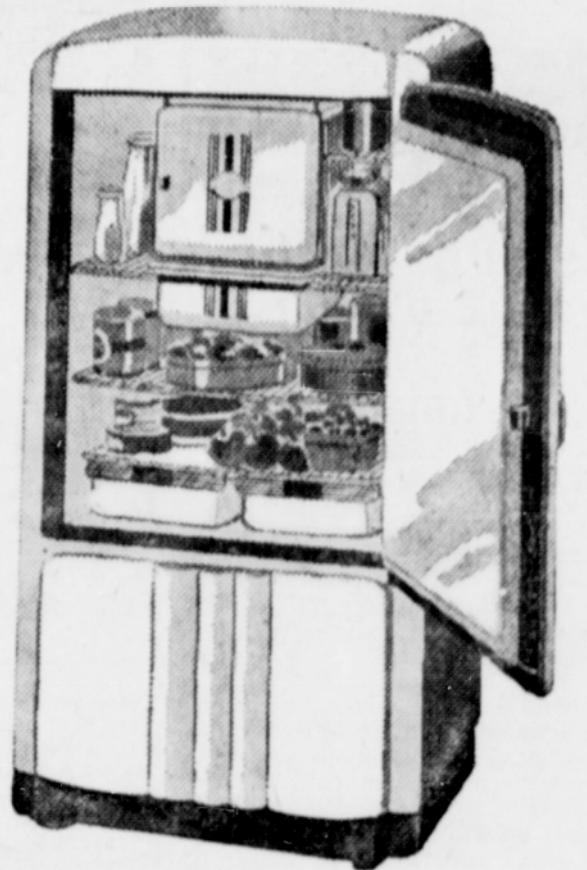

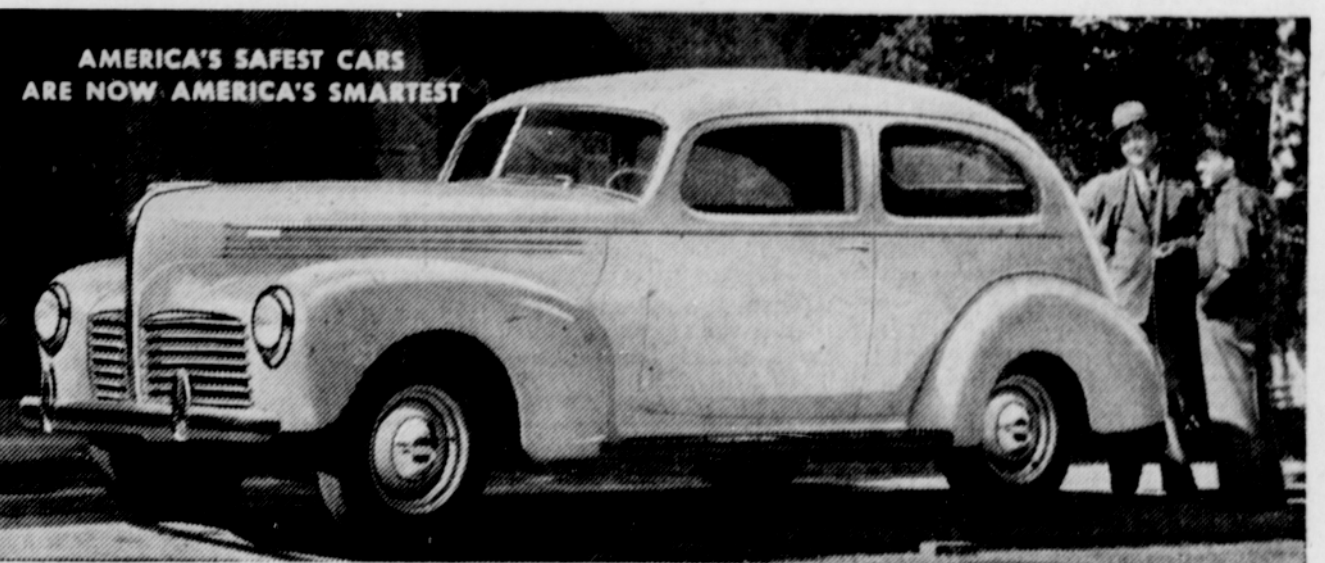
